Afraid for the safety of his children he left home and came to Canada, knowing practically no one and speaking no English. Handicapped in this manner he found no way in which to put his work before the Canadian people and was forced to sustain himself by means of odd jobs.

"But that is all over now," he said with a smile. "Now that I have an exhibition I feel better. I have moved into a new place already and I am bursting with ideas. Ah! I shall do good work."

Mr. Berkovitch said that, contrary to the popular belief, art was great-

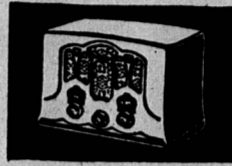

ly appreciated in Russia. In fact the Russians were the first to recognize Picasso and Cezanne. He stated, however, that he likes Canada very much and intends to take out citizenship papers with the proceeds from his first sale.

Canada Owned By Canadians

MONTREAL, April 20.-(C.P.)-An answer to an appeal made to the Secretary of State by the Catholic School Commission of Montreal regarding the status of the Dominion defines Canada as a self-governing state of the British Commonwealth of Nations. The appeal was made when examination papers of pupils disclosed vague and uncertain knowledge about the question "Who Owns Canada?"

The answer from the office of the Secretary of State, signed by Hon. C. H. Cahan, mentioned that Great Britain does not own Canada, any more than Canada owns Great Britain. Canada and Great Britain are each independent members of the British Commonwealth, and the Dominion belongs to the people of the Dominion.

This answer sets at rest a large amount of uncertainty among Canadians regarding the official status of the land of their birth. It was evident from the answers submitted in examinations here that the question had not been sufficiently emphasized in the schools. Dr. Mulhally, secretary of the Catholic School Commission, has promised that in future more attention will be paid to this question.

Deep Sea Diver Likes His Work

GUELPH, Ont. April 20.-(C.P.)-"It's the healthiest job in creation." That's the way William Purvis, bank messenger here, sums up his liking for deep sea diving. For 23 years his workshop was the sometimes translucent and peaceful, sometimes murky and threatening depths of the sea. His daily task during those years was performed on the danger-strewn ocean floor.

In spite of the fact he has given up diving in favor of the less hazardous and infinitely less eventful existence of a bank messenger, he still looks on diving as a job, a nice pleasant job.

When Mr. Purvis starts to tell a story, his listeners thrill to yarns of wrecks gathered to Davy Jones' locker; of strange, beautiful creatures of the bottom of the sea, of sharks and devil fish, and skeletons of men long dead.

Mr. Purvis has also been a sailor and a member of a submarine crew during his time. He started diving when a young man and had experience in that calling in many waters.

Danger, he explains lies not in going down, but in coming to the surface. The diver that ascends too rapidly is just "asking for it." Opposing pressures, water and air, cause an ailment known as divers' paralysis, which almost invariably proves fatal.

Shark is little feared by divers, according to Mr. Purvis. "I've been in shark-infested waters often, but no shark has ever touched me. They come close. The hose attracts them. But they are easily frightened away." The diver opens his valve in his helmet, he explains, and squeezes the cuff. Escaping bubbles frighten the shark away.

"Of course it isn't comfortable when a shark comes too close, but I have never seen one which gave any trouble." Once he encountered a devil-fish-or octopus-on a sandy bottom. It was a small specimen and on the sandy bottom it could not find a smooth rock on which to fasten its tentacles. It clung to him. Purvis signalled for an ascent. The devil-fish rose with him
