After the routine business, the resignation was read of the Educational Secretary, Mrs. Thane A. Campbell, who has accepted the office of Provincial Educational Secretary. Mrs. Eric Mackay was appointed Acting Educational Secretary for the remainder of the term.

The Regent reported on the Citizenship Council, which has lately been organized in Summerside, whereby many new Canadians could meet at different times and enjoy the friendship of others.

Several letters of thanks for parcels received were read, also a letter from Miss Gibson, R.N. of Camp Hill who was seeking information concerning work done with post cards by invalid soldiers.

A letter of thanks was read from Miss Margaret Joan Muttart, who had received the scholarship from the I.O.D.E. and is pursuing her studies in Toronto University.

It was moved and seconded that \$50. be sent to the Endowment Fund in Toronto. The sum of \$50. was again voted to be forwarded to Mr. Chester MacDonald, who is taking his final year in law at Dalhousie University.

Mrs. Eric Mackay stressed the fact that the educational work of the Chapter must be kept up. This includes Empire Study, pen pals, prizes on special subjects for High School pupils and interest in the High School Library. It was voted that \$20.00 be spent for the purchase of Books of Knowledge for this library.

Mrs. A.S. Hopkins, convener of Councilors, gave a report on her work and discussed ways and means of raising funds. The Regent asked that a committee be formed to help with a tag day for the Institute of the Blind on October 22. Those appointed were Mrs. Leslie Simmons, Mrs. W.P. Callaghan, Mrs. C.H. Stewart, and Mrs. W.F. Strong. Mr. Simmons, Post War Secretary reported that food and clothing would have to be sent overseas before October 16. It was moved that \$75 be given for food parcels for overseas. The meeting closed with God Save the King. — S

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**Abertown Film Council Meets**

The monthly meeting of the Abertown Film Council was held in the Beaks Hall with the president, Henry Clarke, presiding. Minutes of last meeting were read and adopted. The report of the Nominating Committee was read and approved. It was reported that twenty groups in nine communities have been organized.

Mr. S. M. MacInnis of the National Film Board explained that the Board cannot meet all the requests being made for film showings in the province, and the only solution is that the communities to which projectors have been loaned will recognize their value and operate their own. Under certain conditions the Provincial Government through the Department of Education will make a grant of \$200 toward the purchase of equipment leaving the approximate cost to the community \$480. A committee comprising Messrs Henry Clarke, Keith Gard, Harry Pridham, Miss Mary Gills and Mrs. Archibald Barbour was appointed to study the proposal of purchasing projectors and equipment for this community and to estimate the approximate cost to each group represented on the Film Council. This information will be forwarded to each group and they will decide whether or not they wish to join in such a purchase.

It was announced that the regular monthly showings of films in the Institute Hall will be resumed in the near future and it is hoped there will be a large and representative audience to enjoy them.

Four films were shown to the Council. "Time and Terrain," a ten-minute color film, is a study in Canadian geology, showing how the earth was formed. "The Birth of a Nation" depicts the destruction wrought by the axe, food, and fire, and how Boy Scouts assist in reclaiming these man-made deserts by taking part in a reforestation project. The second part of this film shows how a Police Boys' Club in Montreal keeps boys off the street and teaches them that the policeman is their friend.

"Come to the Fair" is a short, entertaining film based on the familiar song of the same name. "Canada Calling," an interesting and informative film of the C. B. C. which gives glimpses of those whose voices and music are familiar to all radio listeners, as well as of operators, producers, and directors who make our radio programs possible. The meeting adjourned to meet again the third Monday in October at 8 P. M.
