FAMOUS YACHT STILL SAILING BUT IN SERVICE

HALIFAX, April 25—(C. P.)—With the harbors and rivers opening up, a number of vessels are being taken out of winter quarters here for seasonal services, and the most interesting is the Hochelaga which plies every summer between Pictou and Charlottetown. A colorful route, that, from one beautiful province to another; but the trim

lines of the Hochelaga suggest something more than routine. The stem never was meant for a ferry. It was designed to please royally, for the Hochelaga was built at Leith, Scotland, in 1900, for the Crown Prince of Austria, who fired the first shot in the Great War. Known as the Corsair, she was the Prince's private yacht for several years. Later she was sold to J. P. Morgan for his daughter, who holds a yachting master's certificate. The name was changed to the Watares.

At the outbreak of the war the yacht was purchased by the Canadian government for patrol work, and after the war she lay idle for some time until she was sold to the present owners, the Hochelaga Shipping Company of Halifax. When used as a yacht the ship was considered the finest of her

class afloat. The saloons and cabins were finished in teak and mahogany, paneled with magnificent heavy silk tapestries. The doors were full length bevelled mirrors. Many of the attractions still may be seen, and they are a source of great interest to travellers.
