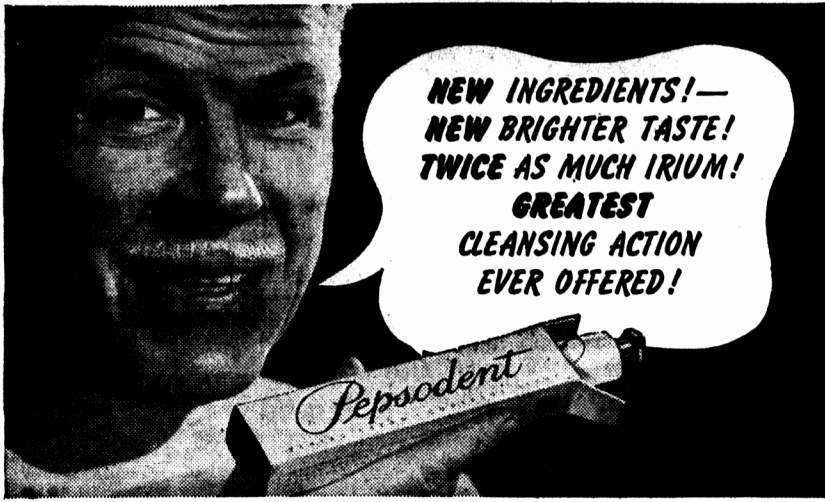

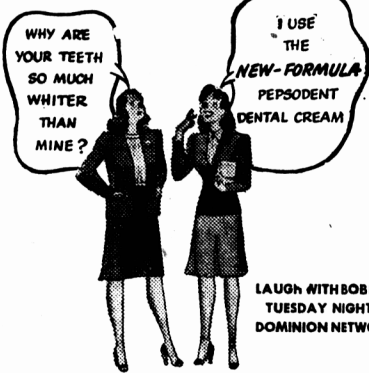

DEEP SEA DIVING COURSE PLANNED

QUEBEC, May 15.—A three-month deep sea diving course will be inaugurated in Quebec City June 3, as part of another re-adaptation centre, it was announced yesterday.

Following agreements between the Quebec Government and the Dominion Department of Labor, the course is being given for the first time in Quebec and has been prepared by the best qualified persons.

The fireplace offers a pretty recess in which to frame such arrangement. The brass acacia leaf, for example, can be filled with green leaves (lemon leaves, laurel, or hemlock) which, though they're repulsive, will keep green for some time.

A California designer has created a fireplace screen that is especially designed with a wire back as a support for growing ivy or vines. A window box, planted with flowers and vines could be placed on the floor in front of such a screen, and the vines trained to form a cool network of green.

Low Iron Stands

Low iron stands, that will hold three or four pots are available in the summer furniture departments of many stores. These stands are painted white and look cool and fresh when filled with vines. If you have such a stand at home, give it a "white paint" treatment to make it look new and use it for a summer screen in the fireplace.

A friend of mine, instead of using a wooden screen, or screening her fireplace with plants, used a heavy white shelf paper and pleats it into a huge fan, turning up the end and clamping it firmly so that the fan holds its shape. This white fan, placed just inside the fireplace between the and-irons, takes away the heat and is cool and effective. These simple ideas are easy to carry out and anyone of them will make your fireplace attractive during the summer months.

KEEP TRIMMINGS TRIM

Collars, cuffs, and dicskeys are giveaways to your grooming habits. To look right they must be crisp and immaculate. Use starch to make them so—2 tablespoons to a basin of water as the last rinse.

WHAT ABOUT MEN'S TIES

If anyone knew a sure-fire way to make old ties look like new, his fame and fortune would be made; but cleaning and pressing neckties can stymie even the professional. It isn't easy to remove stains from the fabric, but sometimes ties can be refreshed and made to look better if they are sprayed with dry-cleaning fluid where the knot has been tied. Moisten a pad of cheesecloth with a little cleaning fluid, and rub gently over the soiled places.

Pressing a necktie takes a bit of doing, too. Cut a piece of stiff cardboard the shape and size of the large end of the tie, and insert it between the two layers of material. If the cardboard is thick enough, it will prevent creasing at the end. Place pressing cloth over the tie, dampen, and iron. As you press, keep straightening the material with your left hand just ahead of the iron. For expensive

MONTREAL, May 15.—Work has been completed on the remodeling and redecorating of the United Theological College University street, now only one-third of its former size.

U. N. B. Graduation Scheduled Thursday

FREDERICTON, May 14.—(CP)—Four honorary degrees will be conferred by the University of New Brunswick at the annual convocation Thursday afternoon.

Fisheries Minister H.P.G. Bridges said Miss Marie Louise Saint John high school teacher and author, will receive the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws.

The honorary degree of Doctor of Science will be conferred upon Mrs. J. Brown Maxwell, Fredericton, author and historian, who will receive an honorary Master's Degree in Arts.

Immigrants Are Welcome

CAPE TOWN, South Africa.—Spurred by the possibilities of the gold strike at Odendaalsrust in the Orange Free State Minister of the Interior C. F. Clark has announced that the Union of South Africa will welcome large-scale immigration from Europe to provide whatever labor is needed by the new mines.

Mr. Clark said there was no quota for immigration in South Africa and existing legislation allows as many immigrants as the country can absorb. It is not legislation but transport and accommodation that were lacking.

The department of the interior is well aware of the necessity to bring in as many suitable immigrants as possible, said Mr. Clark. "Suitability is not judged on nationality or religion but simply on the applicant's ability to fit in with the Union's economic plan and become a useful citizen."

The government still required that prospective immigrants have assurance of employment of a financial guarantee.

Prime Minister Smuts has outlined the government's peacetime defence policy as including a permanent force of approximately 10,000 men, backed by a citizen army of young men similar to a force maintained before the war. Twenty thousand men have already enrolled in the citizen army.

A naval defence force will be developed on a large scale with specially-trained coastal garrisons. The South African air force will be maintained largely on a permanent basis and will include

15 squadrons of bombers and fighters.

Special emphasis will be laid on training and the army will be equipped with the most modern equipment.

The premier said the question of South Africa's contribution to the United Nations' international army had not yet been discussed.

The Union's growing coal exports are to be regulated by the new South African Coal Co-ordinating Committee which will deal with allocations in co-operation with coal committees in Washington and London. Brig. J.D. White, former deputy general manager of the South African Railways, has been appointed the Union's representative with the London committee.

The Union is committed to supply about 300,000 tons of coal monthly for bunkering ships in West Africa and a number of Atlantic and Mediterranean bases, for Allied armies in Italy and for the United Nations Relief and Rehabilitation Administration in Greece.

A new company has been formed to hold a cargo of diamonds recovered from the East Indian diamond mine, which sank 150 miles off Durban in 1928 and is believed to contain a million diamonds and specie. The company believes the ship contains a treasure of more value than the million-pound haul recovered from another ship, the Egypt, 20 years ago.

Would Cut Tax For Mothers With Jobs

NEW YORK, May 13.—(CP)—Working mothers deserve a break, believes Morris Ernst, lawyer, writer and veteran champion of the under dog.

"A career woman who must hire a housekeeper to take care of her children while she works should be allowed an additional income tax exemption for this expense," says Mr. Ernst whose tenth book, "The First Freedom," has just been published.

The problem first came to his attention, he explains, when a young woman lawyer was hired by his firm at the usual starting salary of \$50 a week. Since she was married and had a small daughter, she had to hire a housekeeper at a salary of \$30 a week. This left \$20 of her salary free. Out of this she had to pay for lunches and carfare, averaging about \$4 a week, and in addition \$4.50 per week was withheld for income tax. After paying the necessary expenses she had left a grand total of \$8.50 a week.

After a few months the young woman brought the figures to the boss and explained that she was resigning, because she couldn't afford to work.

"There was a brilliant, well-qualified young woman lawyer," said Mr. Ernst. "She could make a real contribution to her profession, could expect to achieve real success in her work. But the price she had to pay for the privilege of work-

ing was too high. She couldn't afford it."

Would Interest Congress

Mr. Ernst is trying to interest women's organizations in putting the problem before Congress. He is urging legislation to allow a special exemption for working mothers, recognizing the wages of a housekeeper or nursemaid as a necessary business expense. Says he:

"The government wouldn't lose any money. The working women thus aided would increase the national income so that the total revenue to the government would be greater. It's a free country, and I believe qualified women should not be required to pay a premium for the privilege of following their chosen careers."

"I don't follow the old theory that every woman's place is in the home. There are some women who are better qualified for business, who can make a real contribution to society outside the home. These women should be able to hire qual-

ified persons to run their homes and take care of their children during the working day, with a proper provision in their income tax recognizing this expense.

"The working mother has enough problems already. The government should not add another in refusing her a fair tax exemption. I believe in encouraging individual enterprise, whether it be in the case of a man or a woman. One of the most of the most important freedoms in our national economy is freedom to work."
