 FEES—\$3.00 per cow which includes three services to cow if necessary; must be cash, and paid at the time of insemination.  
 CALLS received between the hours of 9 A.M. and 1 P.M. will be attended to same day. This includes Sunday.  
 Telephone number, 161-3. This phone number is temporary until other connections can be made.

The purpose of the Unit is to improve the grade cow by the use of outstanding sires which are now in the Unit. The success and continuous operation of this Unit depends on the co-operation and support of the dairymen and farmers.

The managing director would be pleased to discuss the supplying of semen to areas on the Island, that can form their own organization.

If there is demand enough for semen a course whereby outside groups could send an inseminator to the Unit for instructions may be arranged.
