Market

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, April 26.—The spot cash grain market was again quiet today there being no im- provement in the local export buyers for supplies, the tone was steady and prices were unchanged. A firmer feeling developed in the flour market for spring wheat grades but there was no change in prices announced. The volume of business for export account showed no improvement the de- mand still being restricted. But the local and country demand was steady with car lots of first pat- ents quoted at \$9, second patents at \$8.50 and strong bakers at \$8.50 in jute bags, ex track, less ten cents per barrel for spot cash.

The condition of the market for winter wheat flour was unchang- ed, prices being fully maintained with a moderate amount of business passing. The tone of the market for all lines of millfeed remains very firm with prices unchanged. The trade in haled hay showed no improvement and the market was quiet with no change in prices to note. A firm feeling continues to prevail in the egg situation owing to the continued good demand for supplies for storage purposes. Sales of western extras were re- ported at 30 1-2 firsts, seconds at 25 1-2 per dozen f.o.b. Saskatche- wan, and purchases of Ontario ex-
