Mr. Nicholson sang very feelingly, 'The Sand of Time are Sinking.'

The remains were laid to rest in the family plot in Hartsville cemetery.

Indian Natives Said Prisoners in Own Country

VANCOUVER, JAN. 27 - (CP) - A new newspaper, designed to bring about a better understanding among the Indians of Canada, has made its appearance here. For the present it will be issued monthly. Sponsored by the Native Brotherhood of British Columbia, Inc., The Native Voice, small, eight-page tabloid has a circulation of 7,000. Its editor is 46-year-old Jack Beynon, a member of the Wolf Clan, Thompsons Tribe, of Port Simpson, B.C. A First World War veteran, he was injured overseas and is able to get around only with the aid of crutches.
In an editorial on the front page of the paper's first issue, Beynon describes Canadian Indians as 'prisoners of a controlling power in our own country - a country that has stood up under the chaos of two world wars beneath the guise of democracy and freedom, yet keeping enslaved a native people in their own land.'
'The white people don't know enough about us,' he says. 'Even our own tribes don't know each other well enough. The Native Voice is attempting to bring them together.'
'This is the first time Indians have been able to have their news and views presented.'
Editor Beynon plans to use the paper to publicize campaigns taken on by the native brotherhood, such as the recent fight which brought Indian children under the Children's Allowance Act. Beynon is

proud of that campaign - he organized it.
The paper takes as its motto three objectives set down in the constitution of the native brotherhood.
1. To work for the betterment of conditions, socially, spiritually and economically for its people.
2. To encourage and bring about a communication and co-operation between the white people and native Canadians.
3. To join with the government and with all those who have at heart the welfare of the natives of British Columbia and for the betterment of all conditions surrounding the lives and homes of the natives.
