Cecil, Minister of War Trade replied vigorously to a speech in which Col. Arthur Lynch, Nationalist, had criticized the government's policy in the Balkans and Greece. Col. Lynch asking "Whether any outside influence had been allowed to affect the British policy."

This reference, which apparently was to the former friendship between the Royal families, provoked a prompt retort from Lord Robert Cecil.

"It would be impossible at this stage, and under present circumstances," said Lord Robert, "to enter into a discussion of what we or allies have said or are going to say to Greece in reference to the present crisis in European affairs."

"As far as the strategic situation of the Balkans is concerned, it has been guided exclusively by military considerations, and the only people who had anything to say in deciding the military movements were the proper military advisors of the government. The suggestion that any person, whether strictly a member of the government or not, had used any influence to deflect the policy of this country from the principles of sound strategy is absolutely baseless and utterly unworthy of this House."

National Council Of Y. M. C. A. Military Dept.

FORTY-THREE CANADIAN Y. M. C. A. CENTRES IN FRANCE.

Major Birks who is in charge of Canadian Y. M. C. A. Military Work overseas, writes:

"In France I found a very interesting situation with forty-three centres being operated in the Canadian corps, these plants running all the way around from one equipment composed of canteen marquee, but for writing and huge concert marquee, accommodating a couple of thousand men at a single spot, down to the tiny dugouts where not more than four or five can be allowed in at one time."

MEN OF CRACK BATTALION TAKE COMMUNION.

At the evening concert in a Y. M. C. A. tent in France the "Y." officer made the following announcement: "Boys, tomorrow night the ... Battalion goes back to the trenches, so in place of your usual concert, I have asked the Padre (Chaplin) to hold a communion service."
