A DAY FROM A CAMPER'S DIARY.

(Two ministerial friends in the western part of the Province were enjoying their vacation by camping out on the North shore. The following extracts from a diary written for a friend have been secured and published as being of interest to others.)

Tuesday evening. We came into camp again this evening leaving Kensington after the arrival of the evening train, getting here by nine o'clock. Found that during our absence some friends had called leaving large quantities of good things to eat. Shortly after our arrival came G. and H. They brought quite a basket of provisions with them, so we are well stocked up for at least a week to come. We took a light supper, and after considerable conversation adjourned to the bedroom where we made up two beds out of the materials we had at hand.

Wednesday evening. Tired, tired, tired, after a long, hard day that has been beautifully pleasant in every particular of it. It is a day to stand out in our remembrance for all time to come. For we have been more than fifteen hours out on what a clerical friend of mine is pleased to call "the briny deep"—fishing, sailing, and watching the fishermen fish. I had arranged with Capt. J. H. that we should go out with him today, and the day was ideal in every particular for such a trip.

It was midnight last night when we composed ourselves to go to sleep, and just a quarter past four when the call came to "up and dress." We fear our visitors did not enjoy their soft couches as much as did we who are more used to them. At any rate our persuasive tongues failed to induce them to run with us to the beach for our usual morning dip. We took a hurried cup of coffee then over to the ship.

Immediately the lines were cast off and we were away. The sun was up, but was shining fitfully behind a cloud, and we knew that we were to have a fine day. The men had seen a sign of mackerel "schooling" the day before—the first time in five years on these coasts—and so today we were towing the seine boat with the seine in, hoping again to see and capture a school. We were not yet three quarters of an hour's sail off the harbor when a school appeared—then another and a third. We signalled by flag to another schooner, it having been arranged that were a school of mackerel to be seen, they should come to help, as it takes nine or ten men to manage a seine in such circumstances. The second schooner answered our signal by heaving down upon us, and the seine boat was got ready. The five men of our crew, being joined by the four men from the other ship, left in the seine boat to follow one of the schools, leaving the schooner in charge of the four passengers. We watched them with interest, and to pass the time we got out some cod-lines, and tried to fish; but we had no good luck and only caught half a dozen or so. After while we saw the men in the boat playing out the seine, and knew that they were trying to surround the mackerel. It soon appeared that they were unsuccessful, for they pulled in the seine again and rowed for the ship. It appeared that the seine had not worked well, not having been in the water for five years, and some of the younger men being altogether strange to its use. Now the seine was taken on board the ship, and then carefully placed back in the boat again in such an order that it would play out rapidly and correctly when again surrounding a school of mackerel. This took about an hour. Then the sails were trimmed up, and we began to sail toward where the set nets were—keeping a sharp lookout meanwhile for a new school. Soon one was seen, and the ship started, going following a dory. They rowed probably for a mile when they cast out the seine. Taking the wheel I brought the ship nearer to where they were. The wind was very light, there being scarcely a ripple on the water. That, and the fact that we were five miles off shore with plenty of sea room, gave me confidence in my seamanship. Then S and H got impatient to see what was going on, and the vessel not going fast enough they took the remaining dory and started, leaving me alone on the vessel. However I followed slowly and passed near enough to talk with the men and see them taking mackerel out of the seine into the dories. Then I brought her up on another tack, and then brought her around and back again to the fishermen who by that time were ready to come on board. Their catch of mackerel was about five barrels, but they were all very young, measuring about ten inches in length. Had they been full grown it would have been a valuable catch. Capt. J.
