THE following interesting extracts are from the diary of John Dickleson, Summerside, who has kept a careful record of important events and weather conditions for the past twenty-four years or more:—

Dec. 2, 1880 Quite a number of farmers are plowing today. Only two days so far this season in which the plow has been stopped by frost.

Dec. 1, 1890—Very heavy snowstorm, with the highest tide in many years, doing great damage to wharves. Steamer remained at wharf all day. On the 2nd she went to Pt. Du Chen and thence direct to Charlottetown. Ice making very fast.
