Girl of 19 Accused of Bad Complexion
 (Before Mr. Justice Kruschen)

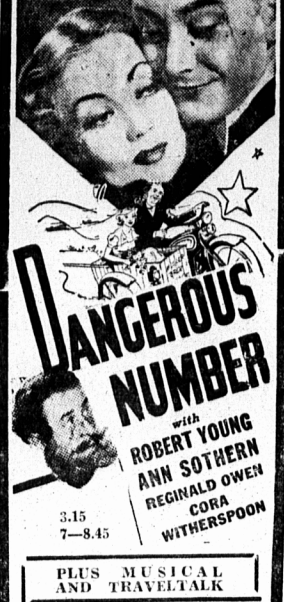
JUDGE: Jane Smith, you have had a fair trial and you have been found guilty of the charge made against you.

JUDGE: Very well, then. Your crime may not have been deliberate, but it was one of serious neglect. You admit that though you do not get enough time for adequate open-air exercise you have never troubled to take steps to prevent constipation. Your complexion inevitably suffered.

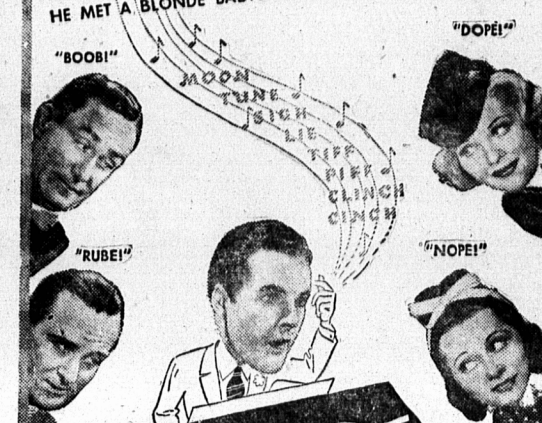

France's Next War Trouble In Africa

PARIS, Feb. 14—(AP)—French military leaders agree that France may have to fight most of her share of the next war in Africa. Edouard Daladier, National Defence Minister, and Pierre Cot, former Air Minister, said so recently in the Chamber of Deputies.
 French officers declared that the agreement between Germany and Italy provides, in case a general war breaks out, that Italy will attack French North African possessions and her Mediterranean Coast in Europe. Germany would turn nearly her whole force east against Czechoslovakia and Soviet Russia, trusting to Italian action to keep France from her rear.
 Premier Mussolini announced "the centre of gravity of Italy's military power has moved south of Sicily." That was after he reached accord with Germany and Yugoslavia.
 Mr. Cot, speaking of the mass flight of 500 French bombing planes to North Africa, declared: "We are unanimous today in foreseeing that the danger may be greater in North Africa than on our northern Front. We must therefore be able immediately to transfer an important part of our air forces."
 Daladier declared: "The events which are happening at the Frontiers of our North African possessions and in proximity to Tunisia reinforce my opinion that our land defenses in Europe must be made airtight."
 France, Daladier revealed, has 130,000 men of her standing army in North Africa. Nearly 600,000 more are available among the native populations.
 Deputy Jean-Michel Renaitour, Chairman of the Chamber Navy Committee, said:
 "Army crews from Libya (an Italian Colony) are massing on the Frontiers of Tunisia. Spanish Morocco harbour shelter the fleets of German and Italian Algeria is being shelled by Anti-French propaganda made by the totalitarian states."
 Deputy Gratien Candace, Navy Budget reporter, declaring that the Western Mediterranean will be the scene of "terrible fighting" in the next war, said France's Navy must plan to keep its sea routes open to its West Indian Colonies.
 "It will be from the West Indies storehouses that we will get food, oil and supplies in the next war," he said.
 Martinique and Guadeloupe are near Trinidad and Venezuela, rich in oil. We must stock oil there so we can get it when the Mediter-

REMEMBER WHEN

 Methods were soon found of sterilizing the fish residues for special equipment, which equipment has been steadily improved as required by the growing demands of the industry. Today, a fish meal made from the rationed bones and flesh of non-oily edible white fish, such as cod and haddock, and known as "White Fish Meal," is produced regularly throughout the year by a number of fish meal plants at the more important fishing centres along the Atlantic Coast, particularly in Nova Scotia. White fish meal is not only pure and safe for all stock, but is sold under a Government Guarantee as required by the Feeding Stuffs Act, 1937. It is the most valuable addition that has ever been made to the rations of live stock and poultry, and has contributed enormously to the improved health of our domestic animals; it has also done more than anything else to make possible the quicker growth and heavier production of milk, bacon, and eggs, three of the more important branches of Canadian farming.

That Body of Yours
 By James W. Barton, M.D.
WEAK AND PAINFUL FEET
 During examination of recruits for the war the number of cases of flat feet, hammer toe, bunions, and other foot defects was very large. While some of these cases were due to "pointed" and narrow shoes, a great many were due to "weakness" of the foot, either inherited, or from standing too long in one position—motor-men, policemen, clerks, or from infection of the joints of the foot from diseased teeth or tonsils.
 To-day, fortunately, shoes are sensibly built for both men and women, and there is less trouble with the toes, arches, and soles of the feet. There are, however, a great many foot sufferers who try various makes of shoes, get all kinds of foot "aids" and yet have no comfort with their feet.
 Now, as mentioned more than once before, feet are as important as the head in making a living and enjoying life; a pair of aching feet can take away all the pleasure the individual less keen about getting about, and upset digestion and other body processes.
 In discussing the treatment of foot disorders in the Journal of the American Medical Association, Dr. Dudley J. Morton (a name famous in the treatment of foot disorders) New York, states that the first thought is to remove pain and establish good working ability in the foot. The three causes of pain and loss of good working ability are: (1) irritation, (2) deep injury or changes due to inflammation, and (3) disordered mechanics—where the bones of the foot are not being held together or up in their proper places by the ligaments (which hold the bones together), and the muscles which hold the bones up in their proper position.
 The "irritations" are corns, calluses, warts, which should be removed by surgery, chemical preparations, or X-ray. Naturally the shoes should be properly fitted.
 The "injured" foot due to wrong standing, to some infective process—teeth, tonsils, or poor circulation, requires rest, removal of infection, and stimulation of the circulation by hot and cold applications, the light exercise such as working the toes and trying to grasp a small object with the toes.

Stock Food From The Sea

For hundreds of millions of years so geologists tell us, the sea has been stealing from the land enormous quantities of all those substances which make animal life possible. The "wealth" which from the sea is leached by various agencies into streams and eventually into the oceans. Land is also robbed of its wealth, when, in addition to the regular losses through drainage it is steadily cropped or stocked and the resultant wastage not made good by heavy fertilization, or by the generous use of stock feeds rich in the lost substances.
 Many years ago, farmers discovered the feeding value of waste fish for their live stock, but because they did not know how to sterilize it and convert it to a suitable food stuff, its use was often ill-advised and had results experience-

since the minerals are in a form most readily absorbed by the animal. Not only are large, healthy animals produced, but losses from sickness due to "mineral deficiency" are reduced to a minimum.
 It is now recognized that many of the problems of animal nutrition and disease are undoubtedly associated with the supply of mineral matter in the feeds. Tests have proven that where 10 per cent of the balanced ration is white fish meal it is not necessary to add other minerals to the ration although additional mineral matter is good assurance and may be added if desired.
 White fish meal also contains from 64 to 70 per cent and sometimes more of crude protein, and it may be interesting to note that mutton contains only 10 per cent, pork on an average 15 per cent, fresh state contains nearly five times as much lime or calcium as beef.
 As generally supposed, white fish meal does not contain a taint. It has been proven by leading nutritional experts that white fish meal, if made entirely from the heads, bones, and fish scales, and white fish, produces no taint in bacon, pork, milk, eggs or chickens. Fish meal should always be bought with a guarantee and purchased should be made from firms of good repute.
