CRERAR The New Menace confronting Canada

A group of extreme Free Trade farmers, headed by Wood of Alberta, Langley of Saskatchewan, Morrison of Ontario, Caldwell of New Brunswick, and Crerar of Manitoba, are today appealing to the feelings and prejudices of farmers as a class.

Crerar is the titular leader of this combination, whose policy is the greatest menace that has ever confronted Canada.

This group is under the dictatorship of Wood, the autocratic Missourian, and so dangerous are its policies that Clark and Fletcher, two of its ablest members, have resigned.

Both Wood and Crerar are out and out Free Traders. They are pledged to abolish every shred of Protection in our Tariff.

When every other important country in the world is increasing its Protective Tariff, Crerar would open wide Canada's gates and flood the country with products of the United States—at the same time that country having shut out millions upon millions of dollars worth of the produce of Canadian farms.

The Canadian Farmer needs Protection as much as does the producer in other Canadian industries.

The principal consumers of the products of our farms are our own people who make their living in the industries of our towns and cities, industries that have also been fostered by Protection.

Crerar's policy would destroy the Tariff, hand the farmers' home market to foreigners, strange Canadian industry, throw thousands of Canadian men and women out of work and drive them across the Southern border for employment.

Every patriotic and public spirited Canadian should renounce Crerar, the man who would wreck Canada's industrial, political and economic structure.

WHAT is the Great Big Issue before the Canadian People in the coming Election?

There is but one—and one only—namely, Free Trade vs. Reasonable Protection.

The People of Canada once more are called upon to decide on the Principle of Protection.

Men count but little—but Principles and Policies and the Interests of the People are enduring.

Canada is once more at the Cross Roads. The issue has been fought out many times in the past and the People of Canada have always stood firm for Protection.

Everybody Knows Just Where Meighen Stands.

Meighen stands four square for the Protective Principle—for reasonable, moderate Protection—for a Tariff to protect all Canada's industries, all Canada's workmen and all Canada's homes.

He is absolutely opposed to Free Trade, just as the leading statesmen of all other important countries are. He believes in a Tariff merely sufficient to enable Canada to encourage and develop all its industries, to keep our workmen at home, and to induce more men and money to come to the Dominion.
