BUENOS AYRES, Argentina, May 20.—La Prensa expresses approval of President Wilson's note to Germany. It says that if the principles set forth in the note do not prevail their will be an end to neutrality and that a universal war will follow.

The Razon says: "The United States and other neutral countries have already suffered too patiently, morally and materially."

The Diario declares that Germany has violated the principles of international law and is deserving of no sympathy from civilized nations.

"The United States note signifies that country will tolerate no more aggression." This newspaper says further: "The war zone ought to disappear. If not, a rupture would not be astonishing. South America supports the energetic attitude of the United States."
