In preparing to view the eclipse of the sun, to-day do not use ordinary stained glass which may possibly injure the eye, but prepare some smoked glass. This you can prepare by holding over a candle; thus you can make the coating as thick as you desire. Try to have it as even as possible. The sight for those in the path of totality, that is for those who will see the sun as entirely covered over, will be a very grand one. The rest of us, who live outside of that path, will see it as almost, but not quite, covered. As it will appear in Charlottetown about eleven twelfths of the sun's surface will be hidden at the middle of the eclipse—say at 10.15. Still it will be quite worth our while to view it. All living in Charlottetown will see it begin between 8.52 and 11.36 o'clock a.m. So you can use your own smoked glass, and lend it to the others who haven't known to get one ready, for there will be plenty of time for you all to see the wonderful sight.

THE Marchioness in the Ottawa Free Press says: One of the Canadian nurses in South Africa has very kindly sent me a copy of the Cape Argus, a weekly illustrated paper published at Cape Town, containing an article on No. 3 General Hospital at present the largest Military Hospital in South Africa. It is situated on a dry and well sheltered spot on the camp ground Rondebosch, and was opened on the 8th December, the first patient received in it being a patch of wounded soldiers after the battle of Colenso. The hospital comprises 105 marquees and 35 bell tents, all of which are most comfortably fitted up with spring matted beds, and equipped with all the latest improvements in surgical and medical art. An interesting picture of the No. 3 hospital staff is in the same number of the Cape Argus. It is taken from a photograph and shows the entire personnel, from the colonel to the cook. Miss Georgina Pope of Prince Edward Island is easily recognized among the nurses, and it is pleasant to note that she is given one of the places of honor in the centre of the group just behind Colonel Wood, who is sitting in the foreground. Mrs. Bagot is to the right of the Colonel, and strike one as very handsome in her white nursing dress.

A FOX FARM.—A Port Elgin correspondent of the Sackville Post writes as follows: Mr. Oulton of Oulton's Corner, Bedford, was speaking to your correspondent the other day about the success his brother, Trenholm has raising foxes on Prince Edward Island. He has several old foxes and raises young ones just as a farmer raises sheep. Mr. Oulton seems to have been quite successful. Last year he sent two valuable skins to London. One of them brought \$1,800, the other only two hundred. The former was one of the best skins ever seen in the market. Of course Mr. Oulton is anxious to raise only those animals whose fur is most valuable, but strange to say in one litter, some will have good fur others will not. The fox farm is situated on a small island off Alberton, P. E. I. It is enclosed with a high wire fence, but it was found they would soon burrow under this, so a deep trench had to be dug and filled with material, through which his foxship could not eat. Last year Mr. Oulton allowed the animals to have their dens underground, but a high tide was the death of several of the most promising youngsters, so he intends to make a change and provide hollow logs for them. As far as we know, this is the only farm of the kind in the lower provinces.

THE many readers of THE GUARDIAN will be pleased to learn that Mr. E. A. Earle, son of Prof. Earle, who has been for the past two years accountant in the Merchant's Bank of Halifax at Victoria B. C. has been promoted to manager of that bank at Westminster Avenue Branch, Vancouver B. C.

A FEW days ago a fisherman at Annandale, Lot 56 picked up on the shore a white substance of which he did not know the name and wishing to find out possible what it was he showed it to Mr. Edwin McFarlane of that place who being unable to name it sent a specimen to Messrs. Johnson & Johnson of Charlottetown, who in turn passed it over to Mr. J. M. Duncan, Vice Principal of West Kent School. Mr. Duncan subjected the specimen to several tests without locating it, finally he applied the test used for ambergris which proved to be the right one, the substance being ambergris and worth from \$3.50 to \$6 an ounce. When first picked up it resembled tallow, but after being kept for some time in a dry place it turned more chalky in appearance. Its color is white and it gives out a most unpleasant odor. The piece picked up weighs about three pounds.
