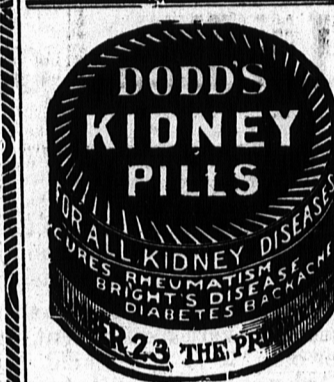

ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION

On Monday evening, the 22nd, a number of the friends of Pte. Charles K. Martin, Glen Martin, gathered at his home and presented him with a military wrist-watch, in appreciation of his work as choir leader, and his readiness to help in every good cause in the community. Mr. Martin was completely taken by surprise. After the presentation, a pleasant evening was spent in playing games, and singing patriotic songs. The address "Dear Friend—It is with mingled feelings of regret and pride that we assemble here this evening. It is to our great sorrow that you are leaving, because your fellowship in our midst is both a help and a blessing to us. We would ill afford to dispense with a citizen such as you. You have been always willing to share and sacrifice your time, to help towards the betterment of the community. You would be the first and foremost to help any good cause, your personality and assistance in the House of God was indispensable. Your vacant seat, for your presence there was an inspiration to the audience and an afflatus to the service. But one with such ideals as you could not remain deaf to the appeal that comes to the manhood of our fair Dominion. Therefore we are proud that the call to restore to stricken Belgium her rights and liberty has seized you, that you have nobly given your service to crush the idea that "might is right." We are proud that we belong to a nation who wants liberty not only for herself but for all who are oppressed. We boast that the British Empire did not remain silent when international law and the rights of man, the progress of humanity and the spirit of liberty, were in the balance. And when she called upon her British subjects to accept her rights, you have nobly responded. It is true some have made a greater sacrifice than others in this terrible conflict. We consider that you have made a greater sacrifice than the average. You have left a comfortable home for the trenches in Flanders, you have severed externally, but the time being the ties between yourself and your beloved spouse, loyal children and a venerable father. All these you have given up that other homes may be happier, that the rule of the tyrant be crushed. Therefore, friends, we beg of you to accept this gift from us. We could not let you go from our midst, without showing in some tangible way our admiration for the noble step you have taken, and the respect we have for you as one of our citizens. And when you may be lonely in your billet or dug out, and look at its face, be soled that there are many more hearts than seconds on it, that beat louder, and stronger than its ticks, with good wishes for you. With this dear friend we wish you God-speed and pray and trust that His mercy, "will give his angels charge over thee, to keep thee in all thy ways." And when the terrible conflict will cease, our prayer for you and those of our loved ones with you is, that you will return in health, and that you shall again enjoy your joyful fellowship. May God deal beautifully with your family and trust that once again you will join them around the old fireplace. (Patriot please copy)
