THE COOK'S CORNER Tomato Relish 7 lbs. tomatoes 2 lbs. celery, diced 1 large onion, chopped 1 cup salt 2 cups white malt vinegar 6 cups sugar

Method: Peel, core and cut up the tomatoes. Chop the celery and the onion fine. Sprinkle with the salt and turn into a jelly bag and allow to drain overnight.

Next day turn into a bowl and, if it tastes too salty, rinse in clear water, again allowing the mixture to drain in a jelly bag. Add the vinegar, sugar, shredded peppers and mustard seeds. Stir well and seal in sterile jars.

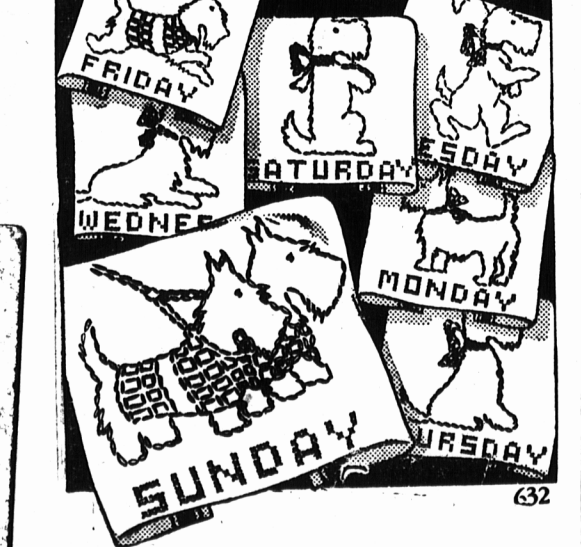
