SEARCHING REVIEW OF FINANCIAL SITUATION BY 4th PRINCE MEMBER

Then And Now By way of comparison Mr. Strong noted that "Our Provincial Finances" by the late Frederick W. Hyndman in the old Province of 1871, prior to Confederation, (wrote Mr. Hyndman) the subject of our Province's financial situation received very little attention from the local Legislature, and the Premier's budget was not taken up with larger subjects of the day, such as education, free trade, and similar questions. When the Province joined the Dominion or relegated to the Dominion, Mr. Hyndman said, "In 1871 a law was passed creating the office of public auditor and defining that position."

Liquor Sales Liquor sales from February last year to January of this year, he noted, amounted to over a million dollars, as compared with only \$400,000 spent on education. Something was wrong. Hon. Mr. Campbell: "What do you mean by spent? What were the profits?" Mr. Strong: "About \$225,000. I see that you do not say that the people of this province drank a million dollars last year, and this amendment was only in force since October. No country has ever built up its economy on the sale of liquor."

Succession Duties He read at length from the articles, dealing with other things with "Succession Duties." He pointed out that "the more Ottawa's financial wizards look into the problem of breaking up this province with 'Succession Duties' the more difficult it appears. A province like Ontario, with lots of millionaires among its residents, can afford to have a very low rate of inheritance tax and still get a high total of revenue therefrom.
