Peking Man Had Feet Like Ape

WAS INTELLIGENT BEING MILLION YEARS AGO

LONDON, Dec. 22—Man who lived in China a million years ago had hands like the modern man, but his feet were like those of an ape, stated Professor G. Elliot Smith, in describing to a Press representative the new discoveries on which these conclusions are based.

"During further exploration of the cave at Choukoutien, where the Peking man's skull was found," he said, "a small bone from the wrist was discovered which is not appreciably different from that of modern man.

"A piece of collar bone has also been found. It is moderately mineralized and a dark reddish brown in color. The individual from which it came was probably an adult, and the length of the bone is about the average of the bone of an adult male in Northern China today. A number of other small bones have also been found.

"It would appear that the feet of Peking Man differed from those of modern man. They were not straight, and he must have walked with his toes turned in—in the same way, in fact, as the ape does. There is, however, nothing to show that he was able to grip with his feet as the apes are able to do.

"No longer is there any room for doubt that this member of the human family had already acquired the skill and intelligence which are the hall marks of his humanity."

WIRELESS USED TO DIRECT LIFEBOATS

LONDON, Dec. 22—Wireless telephony was successfully used on Saturday to direct lifeboats to an imaginary sinking ship during a series of experiments in the English Channel.

The Dover and Hythe motor life boats answered an SOS from a steamer supposed to be sinking off Folkestone.

The lifeboats were guided to the scene by a series of wireless telephonic messages which gave the position of the "casualty."

These messages were transmitted to the lifeboats every few minutes as coastguards at the Sandgate station, who were using a sharp and special instrument, plotted out the changing position of the vessel in distress, after taking into account the flow of the current and the force of the wind.

The experiments were considered to be very satisfactory, proving of great value to lifeboats in finding a vessel or airplane in dense fog or poor visibility.
