Stead shot another goal for Highfield. With only a minute to go, Wedlock on a solo rush sagged the twine, the period ending 2-2.

During the second period the Royals scored two more goals. T. LePage, hard-working left winger getting the first and Wedlock the second, while the Granites were unable to score any. The Granites started the third period determined to tie the score, but in this they were doomed to disappointment. The Royals, checking consistently, broke up rush after rush and went through on Weeks, repeatedly. The period was only about eight minutes old when Hunter River scored again. About five minutes later, Wedlock, heady and fast, centre for the Royals, picked up the disc at centre, stickkanded through the defence, and then passed to LePage, who scored neatly. This ended the scoring for the evening. The Granites used their sub forward line frequently but were very seldom able to get through the visitors defence. The game was capably handled by Mr. Phillips, of Winslow. Only two penalties were handed out. One going to G. Carson and one to Art Woolner.

## ADVANCE GATE FOR BOUT HEAVY

### Total Advance Sales For Miami Battle Are \$162,000.

MIAMI, Fla., Feb. 25—Whether or not the Madison Square Garden millionaires experience a major operation in the region of the box office, in connection with the Sharkey-Scott fight show, this Thursday night, they have not lost confidence in the flat future of this southern Florida centre of sports activity and pleasure hunting.

Before departing tonight for New York, where he sails next Friday for South America on a business trip, William F. "Big Bill" Carey, the Garden's chief executive, made it clear he intended to stick to the five year plan of promoting annual heavyweight shows in Miami, win or lose.

Meanwhile the Garden directorate will consider itself fortunate to break even on this week's show or even to pocket a small loss. With the event only four days off, the actual cash on hand today was not in excess of \$80,000. As much more was considered as the equivalent of cash, in the form of definite orders and reservations, but the total advance sale of around \$162,000 compared unfavorably with the total "gate" of \$407,000 for the last winter's show.

The attitude now is that if the receipts pass \$250,000 three rousing cheers will be given by all connected with the financial operations. On this basis, Sharkey's end would be around \$60,000 and Scott's \$50,000.

As the combatants, all ten of them, swung into the final stretch of tapering off work today, there was no substantial change in the prevailing opinion that Sharkey will win easily from Scott and probably knock the Briton out in short order.

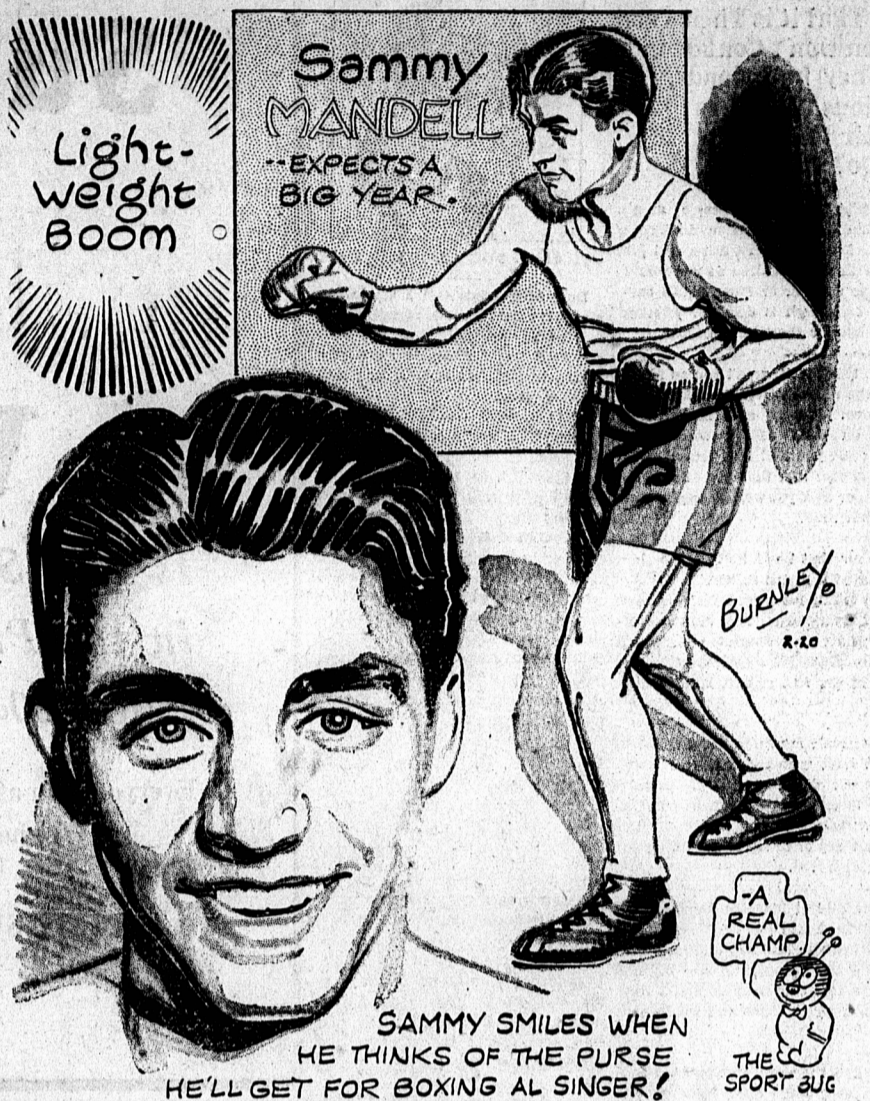

## Big Year For Lightweights



With both Al Singer, of New York's Bronx section, and Jackie Kid Berg, London's Whitechapel Express, already displaying great ability and drawing power as crack lightweights, Champion Sammy Mandell is facing the most prosperous year ever in the annals of that flistic class. The big shot for 1930 should be a championship tilt, probably with Singer, in one of New York's great park arenas where gold-gates are assured whenever pugilistic greats clash.

Of course, the impression is spreading that Mandell's crown is slipping, being tilted more and more by the invisible touch of Time. Speed is the very essence of Sam's power, and nothing can be taken from an athlete more surely than speed merely through the passage of a few years.

A few weeks ago Mandell lost a furious 10-rounder to the arch-hitter Jimmy McLarnin. No title was at stake in this catch-weight affair. It was their second battle. Sammy was fast, but seemingly not the cyclone of yore, as when he completely outboxed Jimmy two years ago.

Perhaps McLarnin's body attacks diminished Mandell's celerity. And then again, Time may have caused the slight but apparent slowing-up of the great lightweight speedster. However, that hard-fought draw did not dull Mandell's spirits. For he is matched to battle McLarnin now in a dangerous welterweight, in another Chicago 10-rounder, a week from Friday.

Those who think they see this champion slipping keep referring to his recent draw with Manuel Quintero, of Cuba, at Miami, Fla., which decision, it should be noted, was considered unfair to Mandell by a big majority of ringside reporters. At that, it probably was just a warm-up for the Rockford, Ill., boy who is perhaps the only lightweight willing to battle such a punching terror as the heavier McLarnin.

Regardless of how he fares next week, Mandell is destined to get the big purse at New York next Summer, with Singer in the other corner. If he does lose the crown, it will be in a welter of wealth then.

There are many unusually sound judges of hockey who would not be surprised to see the Maroons wear the Bruins down in the play-offs, and emerge with the Stanley Cup.
