OTTAWA, Jan. 1 - (CP) - E. Stafford Green, former well-known Ottawa and Quebec city newspaperman and later on the House of Commons staff, died here today after a lengthy illness. He was 56.

A native of Belfast, Ireland, Mr. Green served in the South African war and came to Ottawa in 1903. He was on the reporting staff of the Ottawa Citizen for 21 years.

For six years previous to his appointment to the House of Commons staff, Mr. Green was on the news staff of the Quebec Chronicle-Telegraph.

Surviving are his widow, the former Clara Beaudin, and a daughter, Funeral will be held Wednesday.

BUENOS AIRES, Jan. 3 - British residents of Buenos Aires and Montevideo gave a heroes' welcome today to the cruisers Ajax and Achilles, conquerors of the scuttled German pocket battleship Admiral Graf Spee.

Commanders of the two vessels received British officials aboard after the warships arrived in the River Plata and gave their own versions of the Dec. 13 battle with the Graf Spee off the Uruguayan coast.
