The regular monthly meeting of the city council will be held this evening.

BEAR in mind the Fancy Dress Skating Carnival in the rink on Tuesday evening, Feb. 14th.

ALL skaters at the Carnival are requested to present a card at the door, containing their name and the name of character represented.

IN consequence of the carnival coming off on Tuesday and the necessity of decorating, the rink will be closed to skaters on Tuesday afternoon and opened instead on Wednesday afternoon.

THE flag on the Provincial Building was raised at half mast and the Land Office closed on Saturday out of respect to the late Archibald Macmillan, son of Hon A. Macmillan, commissioner of Crown Lands.

From here he went to Milbridge Maine and subsequently stationed at Machias.

CHARLOTTETOWN TEACHER'S INSTITUTE.—The regular meeting of the Teacher's Institute was held in the Y. M. C. A. Parlor on Saturday evening. President Owen in the chair. The report of the representative to the Women's Council was received and approved of. The representatives of last year were re-appointed. There was a short discussion of the question "Are we justified in requiring our pupils to prepare lessons at home?" Owing to the shortness of time it was decided to continue the discussion at the next meeting. B. F. Messervey gave a clear, logical, comprehensive address on the subject of public speaking. Rev. Mr. Fullerton, Rev. Mr. Spencer, Rev. Mr. Kirby, Dr. Taylor, Messrs Landigas, Scaman and Arseneault discussed the paper highly eulogizing the speaker. The unanimous thanks of the audience were tendered Mr. Messervey to which he replied in a happy manner.

Thirteen passengers, among whom are five ladies, were left at Cape Tormentine. While coming over the party met seven boats crossing towards the New Brunswick Shore. A special train brought the passengers to town, arriving about 5 o'clock. Among them were Mr. and Mrs. George Toombs, of this city, Mr. T. C. Savage, of Montreal, Mr. W. K. Rogers, of Amherst, and Mr. James Pierce, a former Islander, who has resided with his family for thirty years in Boston. Mr. Pierce made a trip to the Is and about five years ago. He is now on his way to see his mother, who lives at Elmira and other relatives at Souris. A number of others who came over yesterday and of those now at Cape Tormentine had been waiting for days at Pictou in the vain hope of crossing by the Stanley.

## IN THE KINDERGARTEN.

The Island's Centenary Celebrated by the Children.

AN "at home" was given by the primary department of the Kindergarten in the Hall on Saturday afternoon who entertained their mothers and friends giving some recitations, vocal and piano solos and choruses which showed careful training by their teachers and good talent on the part of the little ones. After this pleasing programme the children served refreshments in an elderly fashion. The entertainment was gotten up in celebration of the changing of the Island's name from St John's to that of Prince Edward, one hundred years ago and an interesting feature was a short essay descriptive of this event read by little Miss Adele Newbury, who from teachings in the Kindergarten wrote it a few days ago, while in the school. A view of the hand work in drawing, writing, sewing, etc., by the children in the Kindergarten is well worthy of more than a passing notice and should interest particularly all mothers, as well as any who are anxious for the welfare of the coming generation.

The following is little Miss Newbury's composition:

Prince Edward Island was found by John Cabot in the year 1497. John Cabot came from England. He called our Island the Island of Saint John because he found it on Saint John's day. Some people now think it was the first land Cabot found. The first time he came he had his three sons with him. They had only three boats with them. The second time he came he had five boats and about 300 men and enough food to do them for a year, but John Cabot died before they returned to England and his son Sebastian took charge of the boats in his place.

One hundred years ago the people changed the name of the Island because there were a great many places called Saint John. They then called it Prince Edward Island in honor of Prince Edward, the father of Queen Victoria.

SEALED TENDERS will be received at this Office up to 12 o'clock noon, on Saturday, the 11th of March next for the running of the Steamer Elin on the Rocky Point Ferry from Prince Street Wharf, Charlottetown to Rocky Point Pier for such hours and rates and regulations as are laid down in a specification to be seen at this Office, and for a term of one or more years, as may be decided on by the Government at the close of the first year.

The Government to furnish the Steamer Elin in her present condition to run said Ferry and to keep her insured at the Government expense. In case of accident to this steamer another steamer will be furnished by the Government during repairs. Steamer to be returned to the Government at close of term, ordinary wear and tear excepted.

The Government reserves the right to take over the Ferry at any time in case the contractor fails to strictly comply with all conditions contained in the contract. Any or all the tenders may be rejected by the Government.

Tenders must state the amount of subsidy expected from the Government.

The signatures of two good and sufficient securities must accompany each tender.
