

Great Racing Features Yesterday's Fair Opening

Marjorie M., King Frisco And Frank J. Ortolan, Winners In Respective Classes—Col. MacKinnon Has Narrow Escape From Serious Injury In First Heat Of 2.17 Trot.

Upwards of three thousand witnessed the opening day's racing of the Provincial Exhibition yesterday afternoon. The weather was ideal and the various classes hotly contested, in some cases blanket finishes bringing the fans to the edges of their seats.

All the races were won in straight heats yesterday, Frank J. Ortolan, driven by Mac Steels and owned by Samson Grady, Summerside, taking the 2.17 trot; Marjorie M., owned by Kasouf and Jabale, Sydney, and driven by the latter won the 2.13 trot and pace and King Frisco owned and driven by Robert McGowan, Sydney, the 2.25 trot and pace.

Marjorie M. game and speedy Sydney mare was "on" in every sense of the word yesterday. She was in fast company and responded nobly when called upon. This was especially so in the first heat of her race when she drew a trailing position to pull out on the home stretch and win in a driving finish from that good horse Lucky Lindy. It was a well placed of travelling and Marjorie received a big hand after the heat. Hedgewood K. was a good third with Pax Volo fourth, Galey McGregor fifth and Capt. Mac sixth. The time of this heat was 2.12.

The final heats of the race were much faster. Marjorie M. had the pole in this mile and was never headed, although chased to the wire by Lucky, with Pax Volo third, Capt. Mac fourth, Hedgewood K. fifth and Galey McGregor sixth. The third and last heat was much a repetition of the above mentioned, with the times a little above the 2.09 mark.

Hitchman would have qualified more easily but for the misfortune of putting three balls into the woods this morning and taking ten strokes for one hole.

THE GRAND CIRCUIT

Two World's Records Tumble In Handicap Trot At Springfield.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Aug. 23—World's harness racing records were broken today during the second day of Grand Circuit racing at the Illinois State Fair.

Rose Marie Abbe, owned by E. A. Bostain, Chattanooga, Tenn., and driven by Jake Rodman, travelled the second heat of the 2.15 St. Nicholas Hotel pace in 2.00 1/4 to set a world's race record for pacing mares.

Two world's records tumbled in the handicap trot, which was forced into an extra trial when Scotsman, Walter Cox's bay colt stepped the second heat in 2.05. Lock Bunter, with a handicap of 100 feet, won the first heat in 2.06 1/4 and the third in 2.06 1/4. These three heats constituted the three fastest ever produced in a handicap event.

Scotsman started from scratch. Dillon M.C. starting with a 40-foot handicap, was second in each of the two regular heats.

Rose Marie Abbe's record breaking mile proved too much and the gallant mare was forced to yield to Peter at Law and Col. Tom in two other heats.

Great Racing Predicted For This Afternoon

Four Classes On The Card And Every One Slated For Excitement Galore.

Here they are folks, the classes for this afternoon at the Exhibition track. To begin with, there is the 2.16 trot and pace and perhaps a whisper has reached you that a horse named Heather Belle has been brought here from Lynn by Brenton MacInnis a former Charlottetown boy. If you haven't heard of him your ear has not been to the ground, because on the far side of the track where the bearscats munch oats this horse is ballyhooed to the highest. He was a mile in 2.09 1/4 four days ago and any trotter that can pick them up and put them down that fast will start tongues wagging anywhere. But don't think for a minute that Heather Belle has any option on this particular race. Most decidedly he has not. Pitted against him is Abbe Worthy, present holder of the track record (Trotting) of 2.10 and just as fleet of foot this year as he was last. Just to add a little more of the spice of uncertainty the remainder of the class is filled with some great pacers, notable among which is Del Volo from Maine, capable of 2.10 or better. The others are Earle Wilkes, 2.11 1/4, from Sydney, Star D., 2.09 1/4, St. John, Grandma, 2.09 1/4, Charlottetown; Miss Winnipeg, 2.11, Charlottetown; Maxime the Great, 2.11 1/4, Stewiacke, and old Major S. still to be reckoned with after seven or eight years campaigning.

2.25 PACE

This event on the programme will be of foremost interest to Islanders because it brings together a flock of Island and Maritime bred pacers, many of them green to the turf this year. There is no outstanding favorite and the patrons of the track may take their pick of the following: Billy Witt of Kensington; Bingara Todd, 2.20 1/4, Borden; Real Great, 2.20 1/4, Charlottetown; Win-Winkle, Alberton; Mack Volo, Alberton; Johnny Miles, Charlottetown; August Queen, Truro; York-oke, Wellington; June Aubrey, Amherst; Peter Boy, Middleton, N. S.; and Aubrey Boy, Shediac, N. B.

The majority of these horses have never met before and the only thing that is known about them is that in speed and on past form they are all about on a level.

THE BOXER WHO MEETS CLAUDE MACKINNON

Johnny Nemis who places his Eastern welterweight crown in the ring tomorrow night when he meets our own Claude MacKinnon at the Forum over the ten round route has had a wide and varied career during his short sojourn in the squared circle. To chronicle in detail his many battles would take up more space and time than at present available, but the following taken from the Malone, N. Y., newspaper of recent date may prove interesting to local boxing fans:

"Johnny Nemis, Montreal's importation from the Maritimes, is getting a nice habit hereabouts as far as stealing shows are concerned. Not long ago, he blew into St. Albans, Vermont, and gave away some fifteen pounds or so plus a workmanlike pasting to the state middleweight champ. Armand Kid Cloffi, who had been unbeatable there for the last two or three years. As if that shock wasn't enough, he drops into Burlington the next week and hammers their best card, Tony Dragona, into the land of sweet dreams in the fifth of a scheduled "tenner" and what a mess he left of that not-so-gay Bohemian after pelting him with every wallop in the fistic vocabulary! And last, but not least, look what he did to our pride and joy, Patsy O'Day at the Armory last night. Poor Patsy! He never knew what hit him and when asked about it this morning he swore that something fishy must have happened.

We can comply with the requests of our readers that a more detailed description of the main event bouts be given in this publication. We can about last night's fight, anyhow. Here we are:—Date, May 9th, 1932; Place—Malone, N. Y.; Scene—The Armory on River Avenue; Event—Patsy O'Day, Malone, 151 lbs. vs Johnny Nemis, Cape Breton, N. S., 149 1-4 lbs. ten rounds to a decision main event. Round one: O'Day rushes over and pelts the Maritime star with four or five "beats" to the jaw. Nemis slumps to floor. Referee Benjamin waves Patsy to corner and starts counting. Nemis up at "six" and Patsy rushes in for the killing. It was a killing, all right—a killing wallop! Nemis looked a bit uncertain on his pins but suddenly shifted when Patsy got within range and—zowie! A left hook thumbed Patsy's stomach against his backbone. It wouldn't stand for that and Patsy's legs also rebelled and down he went for the count. His mouth opened two or three times like a dying man on a

desert and that was about all; Nemis carries him to corner and leaves ring. Comes back ten minutes later with his street clothes on and they were still working on Patsy. Time of bout 34 seconds. Promoter Dan McKendrick escorts Nemis and his manager, Lawson Bampton to front door where Bampton collects the earnings. Out to side walk they walk and into a two seater Ford roadster while McKendrick waves his hand. The reason for the hurry was that Nemis is said to be going back to the Maritimes for about a month, though it is not known definitely as yet, and he may be seen here within ten days if he does not go there. Now, of all things he has to consider going East again just when he's made himself the big attraction hereabouts. It seems to us that his fans will be viewing lots of high class imported material in local rings as there is no one hereabouts belonging in the same ring with Nemis so that the promoters will have to bring in some good boys to swap leather with the boy who is being boosted as the next Canadian welterweight champion."
