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Literature And Life
By BOOKMAN

BOOKS
Milton has this to say about books. "Books are not absolutely dead things... a good book is the precious life-blood of a master spirit, embalmed and treasured up on purpose of a life beyond life... as good almost kill a man as a good book, he who destroys a good book kills reason itself." Mrs. Browning writes thus about books. "Books are the only men who speak aloud for future times to hear."

The Bible — the book of books — has something to say on the matter. Ecclesiastes says "Of making many books there is no end;" Paul in prison waiting the solitude of winter pleads to have taken to him "the books and especially the parchments;" In the Acts of the Apostles we read (19:1) of the burning of books that were considered harmful. Here is seen in the matter of literature. A bonfire was made.

Books are friends — quiet, informing, and good company. Many a lonely hour is passed more pleasantly because we have something to read.

A good book is worth reading more than once. There are books that we have read a dozen of times. Like friends we like to meet them often.

There is no use in trying to read all that falls from the press. Life is far too short for that. A. C. Benson tells of a clergyman whom he knew who read a great deal but without much discrimination. He was a wearisome talker, and inflicted on his hearers, and if he found that you had not read a certain novel he would go into details which were very tiresome. His main idea was to read everything that came out, and Benson says this about him: "I cannot help feeling that he would have been almost as usefully employed had he confined himself to counting the number of words in the books he read."

Bacon tells us that "some books are to be tasted only... some few to be read wholly and with diligence and attention. We are to read to weigh and consider. Studies have an influence on character — histories make us wise; natural philosophy, deep; moral, grave; logic and rhetoric, able to contend. Reading he says "maketh a full man."

Many people have what they call a bookshelf by the fire. We have heard a list of "the hundred best books" recommended, but that depends on the point of view. A lot will depend on individual taste. Stevenson tells us in one of his essays of the books that influenced him. Our list might contain some of them, most likely it would.

Here are some that might with profit be included: "The Pilgrims Progress" by John Bunyan, to be read as a story, as a study of religious experience, and as a study in simple English prose. For essays, we would include those of Montaigne, where we have a man, and a wonderful man, talking to himself, and we overhear him. Bacon, too, deals with such fundamental matters that he is a fireside friend. Wonderfully delightful is the one I quoted already, A. C. Benson. Then how lovely to take down Matthew Arnold and read the "Scholar Gypsy" or "Thyrsis," so full of beauty and rich with thought. Chesterton once said "if you had to burst a blood vessel in reading Browning leave him alone; but we can read him without that risk. He is good for mental and moral exercise. No bookshelf by the fire should fail to have a copy of the "Meditations" of Marcus Aurelius. A thoughtful man told me once that next to the New Testament he fed his soul on the teaching of him and Epictetus—good fare for any one.

With the writer to the Hebrews, I would ask "what can I more do for time would fall me, but surely some of Scott, Dickens, and many others have a claim for a place on that shelf.

I read somewhere of two men who entered a humble home and found on the window sill, where an aged man was sitting a much worn copy of Burns; and one said to the other that is fame. "Much more," came from a richly bound copy in a book case and never read." Is it not a sign of fame to keep a man by the fire reading a tattered copy of a book two hundred years old?
