### REPRESENTATION IN HOUSE OF COMMONS

(Continued from Page One.)

The hon. member for Pictou would have passed with it and at this moment it would be the law that under no circumstances should the representation of the Province of Prince Edward Island be diminished beyond the number of Senators. However, that course was not adopted, and while I am not here to criticize or defend the other body in this legislature in regard to their action on the resolution respecting the increase in the number of senators in the West, I am bound to say that in my judgment the amendment of the hon. member for Pictou (Mr. Macdonald) had no place.

Mr. A. A. McLEAN: I think the hon. gentleman is astray. If he will look of page 5364 of Hansard, he will find that the amendment which was suggested by the hon. member for Pictou was incorporated in the Act and that the amendment was moved here, or suggested to the right hon. leader of the Government (Sir Robert Borden) while the resolution was up in the Senate and before the resolution was passed. Hansard states clearly what the suggestion of the hon. member for Pictou was, and it was accepted by the leader of the Government.

Mr. KYTE: What was the suggestion of the hon. member for Pictou?

Mr. McLEAN: It reads as follows: "Provided, that if the British North America Act, 1867, should be amended by the Parliament of the United Kingdom, in accordance with the address of both Houses of Parliament of Canada in that behalf, passed at the present session, immediately upon the Act of the Parliament of the United Kingdom amending said British North America Act, 1867, in accordance with such address coming into force, there shall be in the Province of the Prince Edward Island three electoral districts defined as follows:—

1. The County of King's shall form and constitute the electoral district of King's and shall return one member.
2. The County of Prince shall form and constitute the electoral district of Prince and shall return one member.
3. The County of Queens shall form and constitute the electoral district of Queens and shall return two members.

This is what was suggested to the leader of the Government by the hon. member for Pictou on the day before the 11th of June and the hon. leader of the Government told the hon. member for Pictou on that occasion that the matter had been suggested by myself to him, but that it had been overlooked and that he intended to place it before the Deputy Minister of Justice in order that he might draw up a clause. Although the hon. member for Pictou handed this form to the leader of the Government, he asked him to incorporate it in the Act, but it did not arrive when it should be incorporated, and the leader of the Government told the hon. member for Pictou that the matter would receive his consideration.

Mr. KYTE: I do not desire to rob the hon. member for Pictou (Mr. Macdonald) of any credit that he may be entitled to for his in camera suggestions to the Prime Minister in respect to what he thought should be done on this question of representation. His statement, however, does not alter my recollection that it has been overlooked to give it to the House. The amendment was proposed by the hon. member for Pictou at a very early hour in the morning, when the Redistribution Bill was receiving its final consideration. The amendment was accepted by the Prime Minister with the understanding that it would be attached to the Redistribution Bill. If it had been attached to the Bill, why it was not attached I do not know.

Mr. A. A. McLEAN: It is attached to the Redistribution Bill and if the hon. member will turn up the Act he will find that it is part of the Redistribution Bill.

Mr. KYTE: Then it is law?

Mr. McLEAN: No, it is not law because it has not come into effect. At the time it was passed in this House the other resolution was in the Senate and it was turned down by the Senate and never became law.

Mr. KYTE: That has reference to the representation in the Senate of the Western Provinces.

Mr. McLEAN: No.

Mr. KYTE: If it is not law it is not because it did not receive the support of the Senate.

of this House, and it does not change the position that I took in the first instance that the whole question was settled as far as this House was concerned by the resolution of the hon. member for Pictou.

Right Hon. Sir ROBERT BORDEN (Prime Minister): The subject which my hon. friend from Kings, P. E. I. (Mr. Hughes) has brought to the attention of the House is one which has been debated on many occasions in the House, and all that has been put forward today, I think, has been brought to the attention of the House on the occasions to which I have alluded. Last year I took the responsibility of leaving the number of members for the province of Prince Edward Island blank in the Bill which was introduced, and I did that for the purpose of giving to those representing Prince Edward Island an opportunity of making their case fully before the committee and probably at greater length and with greater cogency than it might be made in a debate in this Parliament. The reasons why I thought that a desirable course to pursue were set forth in the observations which I made to the House at that time. The Bill was accordingly referred to the committee in that way. It was not, however, referred without some objection from my right hon. friend who leads the Opposition (Sir Wilfrid Laurier), who said, as reported at page 847 of Hansard:—

My right hon. friend, in this Bill, has refrained from making one provision, the absence of which seems to me a weakness in the Bill, and I cannot but think, also a weakness on his part. He refused to determine whether or not the Province of Prince Edward is to have no jurisdiction, or whether or not he referred it to the committee for determination. I have to represent to my right hon. friend that that is a matter upon which the committee cannot have any jurisdiction; it is a matter on which this House has no jurisdiction. Parliament in this matter is not a free agent; the whole question is simply a question of arithmetic.

Then my right hon. friend went on to adduce reasons why in his opinion it was not only a weak but an improper course to take. He said, for example, this:—

But when my right hon. friend leaves it to the committee to determine whether or not Prince Edward Island shall lose one member, what will he say to my hon. friend from Pictou when he says that it is not a Nova Scotia question, but that whether or not Nova Scotia shall lose two members?

Then he illustrated in the same way in regard to New Brunswick and Ontario. Finally he said:—

Therefore, I regret that my right hon. friend has introduced in Canada a principle—no, I cannot call it a principle, but rather a vicious feature—which might land him in very serious difficulties were its necessary implications followed to their logical conclusion.

However, the Bill went to the committee, and the committee gave a careful hearing, as I understand, to members of this House representing Prince Edward Island, and also to members of the Provincial Government of Prince Edward Island, all of whom put their case before the committee with the greatest care and to my command, and the committee eventually made a report to this House. In that report the committee recommended that an address should be passed asking that the British North America Act should be so amended that no greater representation should have a smaller representation in the House of Commons than in the Senate. If the British North America Act were so amended the amendment would take no present effect in any Province excepting Prince Edward Island, where a resolution of which in the House of Commons it would increase from three to four members. As my hon. friend has observed, there was some discussion on the address which I subsequently moved in this House for the purpose of carrying out the resolution proposed, and my hon. friends motion at the moment when that address was moved by my hon. friend from Queens (Mr. McLean), who has just addressed the House, was not satisfied with it, and Hansard, as reported at page 5269 of Hansard, records that my hon. friend has now proposed. He moved in amendment:—

Prince Edward Island shall be entitled to be represented in the House of Commons by six members, the representation to be increased under the provisions of the British North America Act, 1867.

Prince County shall constitute one district to be designated Prince County district, and return two members.

Queens county shall constitute one district to be designated Queens county district, and return two members.

King's county shall constitute one district to be designated King's County district, and return two members.

The hon. member for Queens (Mr. McLean) then used these words:—

While I appreciate the concession of four representatives to the Province of Prince Edward Island, as provided in the last clause of the resolution, I submit that the original terms should be recognized and carried into effect. The Government deserves great credit for this concession, which is of very great importance, but to not think it too much for me to ask that the original representation of six members should be restored.

The amendment was lost on division and the resolution as originally proposed by me passed the House. The result which was reported to the House by the committee was accepted by the House, and I felt that it would not be possible for us to disregard the carefully considered report of that committee composed of five members from this side and four from the other side of the House, who devoted a great deal of attention to the subject.

While I appreciate the spirit in which my hon. friend (Mr. J. J. Hughes) has brought this subject to the attention of the House, and while I appreciate the arguments he has put forward, I would remind him that he has argued somewhat a little too much in other ways. In 1903 he took strong grounds against a motion which was proposed by Mr. Hackett, then a member of the House. My hon. friend at that time was of the opinion—I think I have his words under my hand—that it was not a question of a mistake at the time Prince Edward Island entered Confederation, but that the particular form of expression that was used at the time was the result of oversight or neglect. I do not desire to mis-

quote my hon. friend, and therefore I give his exact words:—

I regret as much as any man can regret that the delegates at the time the Province of Prince Edward Island joined the Union overlooked this important point, and did not provide against the contingency that has since arisen.

My hon. friend did not put it upon the ground of a mistake at that time; he put it on the ground of oversight and he also took very strongly the ground (as will be found by reference to page 10999 of Hansard) of 1903) that the long acquiescence on the part of Prince Edward Island would make it difficult to provide any remedy.

Two years have, of course, elapsed since my hon. friend made that remark. The hon. gentleman also explained in that speech that the reason why the original representation was not reduced in 1882 was not because of reasons which had been advanced in this House and which at one time impressed me, but was due to the fact that the census of 1881 was the first Dominion census after the Island had entered Confederation, and consequently that, so far as Prince Edward Island was concerned, there was not previous census with which to compare it. Therefore he argued that inasmuch as there was no previous census with which to compare the population of Prince Edward Island in 1881, the Government of the day found itself unable to determine whether or not the saving clause, to which he has alluded, could take effect, and so he said there was no reason why the population of the Island should be deducted in favour of the claim of Prince Edward Island from the fact that its representation was not reduced in 1882.

Under these circumstances, it does not seem to me that the House would be justified at the present time in coming to a perfectly opposite conclusion from that at which the House arrived at less than a year ago, when the motion of my hon. friend from Queens (Mr. McLean) was put to the House, which was then considering in committee a resolution which I had the honour to propose. Further, I believe that should be guided, as has always been the practice in this House, by the fact that the report of a committee to whom was confided the particular duty of hearing the claims of Prince Edward Island, and of hearing everything that could be said in favor of the motion which my hon. friend from Queens (Mr. McLean) proposed a year ago and which my hon. friend from King's (Mr. Hughes) is proposing now, should command the support of the House unless there should be very grave and cogent reasons adduced for leading the House to come to an opposite conclusion.

The resolution proposed by me last year went to the Senate by the unanimous consent of the House, and the Senate sent it back with a certain amendment, which by the unanimous consent of this House we refused to accept. My hon. friend from Queen's (Mr. McLean) suggested that I should re-consider this session, and I will give to his proposal in that regard my best consideration and inform him and the House later of the conclusion at which we have arrived.

### WOMAN LEAPS 500 FEET TO DEATH.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 26.—The first successful attempt at suicide by jumping from the Washington monument was accomplished this afternoon, when Mrs. Mary F. Crockrell, a young woman of Covington, Kan., threw herself almost the full length of the elevator shaft in the tall obelisk and fell in a mangled heap at the bottom of the pit. Mrs. Crockrell dropped from a landing 470 feet from the ground and three floors below the steep shaft of the floor, which is 500 feet from the ground. The elevator was up at the time. The woman fell into the pit about thirty feet below the ground level, so that her tumble measured 500 feet.

Two sight-seeing general hospital Walter Reed Army General Hospital were standing on the 470 foot landing when Mrs. Crockrell came running down the inner iron stairs from the top landing. One of the nurses, Miss Edna E. Rockefeller, caught hold of Mrs. Crockrell, while the other nurse, Miss Seger, ran toward the top landing to summon the guards. Miss Rockefeller clung to the sleeve of Mrs. Crockrell's dress, but the sleeve ripped out at the shoulder. Mrs. Crockrell then clambered over the grill work and out on to one of the four girders which bind the elevator shaft to the walls of the monument. Lingered a moment on the girder, Mrs. Crockrell looked down the steep shaft and dropped. It is estimated that the descent only took about five seconds and that the body was falling at the rate of about 250 feet per second when it struck the marble flooring of the pit.

Mrs. Crockrell who was a daughter of the late John Varney, of London

County, Va., was 28 years of age, and the wife of W. F. Crockrell, formerly of Fairfax County, Va., who for the past six years had been living at Covington, Ky., and employed by the Chesapeake & Ohio railway. Mr. and Mrs. Crockrell came to Washington last Wednesday to visit his relatives here, and her relatives at Del Rey, near Alexandria, Va., only a few miles from Washington. She had been troubled with insomnia and a nervous breakdown, and sought relief from several prominent Washington physicians. Pinned to her dress was found this note:—

"I know I can never get well, dear; so this is best. Be as happy as you can. I am a burden to you as I am. This was written on a prescription blank. On the reverse side of the

blank, Mrs. Crockrell had written: "W. F. Crockrell, care of Mrs. J. Gray, Del Rey, Va.; Forgive me, sweetheart, but this is my only way out. Always remember I love you and you are the dearest husband in the world. Please burn my body. MAE.
