**NATURE NOTES**

How weeds get about. Last year's chicken pen was well treated all generally, the Fall, and all expected that would take all this year to recover. But no annual and other weeds and grasses sprang aamin and by the end of June the ground was thickly covered. Now, those chickens had been fed some western wheat, low-grade and did of weed seeds, though we did not know that; and in consequence there were weeds, old and new, to examine. There were plants of the Wild Mustard (Brassica arvensis) and, since we have other Brassicas, it is well to remember that this particular species has a purple blotch at the junction of the branches with the stem. Not so robust was the Field Penny-Cress or Stinkweed (Thlaspi arvense); it has round flat seed pods with a little notch opposite their stalk; they are about half-an-inch across and become greenish orange when ripe. The next was the Wormseed Mustard (Erysimum cheiranthoides), with small orange yellow flowers in terminal clusters, and lance-shaped leaves. What I take to be Green Tansy Mustard (Sisymbrium incisum) had fine-tined leaves, more like a yellow-green, with a whole row of 3-4 inches long. **A CURE FOR OLD AGE?**

Russian scientists, particularly those interested in physiology, are studying function long neglected by the medical world. Some years ago Prof. Alexander Bogomoletz, (now President of the Ukrainian Academy of Scientists) visited Akhazia in the Caucasus, for the purpose of making a special study of the long-lived inhabitants of that region. He discovered, after examining many thousands of them, that in central Akhazia the body's "conductive tissues" (which forms the inner and outer linings of the organs) is unusually well preserved. Further study showed that resistance to disease was largely dependent on its condition. Then Dr. Bogomoletz developed a serum (known as AGO) which has the power of improving the condition of the connective tissue, and consequently preventing diseases that cause the infirmities of old age. There have been three medical conferences in Moscow to study the medical effect of the serum, and an official report was issued, giving the evidence in full. The above is condensed from translation of the first report. It may be possible to examine the other two.
