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Mr. Joseph A. Cullen Returns to Mexico Gold-Dipped Fox Fur English Style Idea

The season for taking fur coats from the moth balls or cedar chests is at hand. The hibernation of the Persian lamb or Hudson seal is about to end. For months furriers have been quietly preparing new ideas and new models. Of the latter there are many, but of the former there are few. Incidentally there are many new names for the old reliable skins and rabbit will masquerade as frequently as ever this winter—from Hallowe'en onward. One of the new ways rabbit will be seen will be gold plated. Metal-plated furs—both gold and silver, are causing somewhat of a mild sensation in England, Canada never imports furs from Britain, but Canada does occasionally import fur ideas from overseas and one of these is the gold plate idea. Stoles and neckpieces of fox, each hair of which has been dipped in gilt, are already being worn in England, and have been seen in Toronto, but so far only in the shops. Some fox skins are silver-tipped. Mole grey fox skins are immersed in a bath of eighteen-carat gold or a solution of silver, and are, in fact, subjected to the same treatment as is applied in the process of electro-plating.

Golden Rabbit. Even more wonderful in its way than the gold-tipped fox is the new golden rabbit. This is a short-cropped skin with a rich gold appearance, which promises to be a great evening vogue in conjunction with broadcapes, tissues and velvets. This season's enterprise has produced a remarkable crop of fur novelties. There is, for instance, a realistic imitation of the costly silver fox, one of the most expensive of all furs. Canadian fox is used in this case, and is dyed the nearest to a natural silver fox, which is actually a brownish black. The white spots and tip on the brush, which are the feature of the natural animal, are then painted by hand, dyer and artist thus contriving to reproduce the perfect counterfeit. Another novelty is the fur that imitates salmon trout. Gazelle dye brown is the basis, and the characteristic spots of the salmon trout are stenciled on.

Tiny Trains. Other ideas in feminine togger have also invaded this city from England. For instance, the latest evening dress has developed a little train at the back. The train is often so tiny that it appears to be trying hard to reach the ground without being able quite to manage it. Small Fur Scarves. Little fur scarves, long and narrow, twisted round the neck and tied in a swifly "pussycat" bow under the wearer's chin, are among novelties for the season. Made of beaver, minkskin or some other close-haired pelt, it is most suitable for wearing with one of the new trim short-coated tailored suits on sunny autumn days.

There is a real art in tying this swifly fur bow, so that there are no little fur necklets with the bow ready fixed, fastening with invisible clips underneath.

Cut Out Monograms. A new freak of fashion is the wearing of decorative "cut outs" of black velvet on the arm. A woman dining the other evening had such an armlet fastened on her elbow, in place of the more stereotyped slave bangle of gold ivory, or jade. This particular armlet was cut out with the letters of the wearer's Christian name, which lay outlined in rich black velvet against the dazzling whiteness of the skin of the arm.

Besides names, monograms are being cut out in similar armlets while another variety of the novelty was shown by a girl wearing a black velvet bracelet, which had cut-out cast as medallion in the centre.

Ostrich. The dance girl has found a new dress novelty in a curly ostrich feather tipper which she throws around her shoulders during intervals between dancing.

Such, at least, is the intention of the tipper, but some girls are finding the tipper so effective a setting for face and neck that they do not wait for a "touch of chill in the air" in order to wear their new possession.

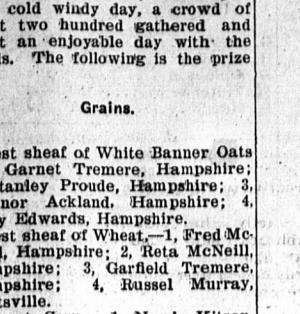

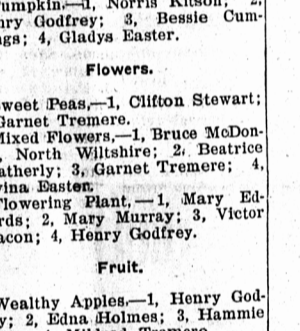
