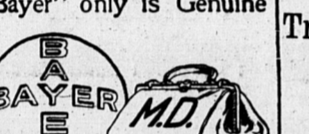

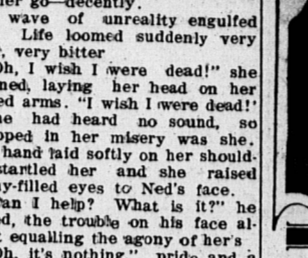

SAXONIA DOCKS AT HALIFAX

After a trip of nine days from London via Cherbourg, the Cunard liner Saxonia docked at Halifax and landed 921 passengers, who proceeded west on two special trains. The steamer came by the southern route on account of ice conditions off the Newfoundland coast. The Saxonia sailed tonight for New York. The Saxonia, reports that at noon, when 15 miles off Chebuco Head, south of Halifax, a meteorite was seen to explode and disappear, leaving a vast amount of smoke, which was visible for over ten minutes. The strange spectacle was witnessed by some of the officers, passengers and part of the crew. They first saw a big burst of flame in the sky and then a long column of smoke, probably fifty feet in length. They believe that the meteorite fell into the sea. Hints for the Motorists

BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH

CELLS DIFFER IN GRAVITY READINGS G. P. H. asks: What causes the different cells of my storage battery to vary as much as fifteen points, in respect to their hydrometer readings, and how can I equalize them? Answer: An individual cell may have defective insulation or be short-circuited by active material that has fallen from the plates. This will cause it to lose its charge faster than the other cells. A cell may have a leaky jar, which results in the escape of electrolyte and calls for an amount of water to be added, which weakens the density of the solution and there are other causes of differences between one cell and another. If, after a long charge, at a low rate, the readings of the cells do not equalize and remain so for a reasonable time, it is advisable to take the battery to a service station and have the cells examined for internal short circuits, and other defects.

BATTERY NEEDS RECHARGING

O. R. asks: How should one refill a battery which shows five volts with gravity readings of 1150? To add more liquid would cause the cells to overflow. Should the cells be emptied and then refilled with a oil to give the proper reading or should they be charged to bring up the gravity? Answer: The battery should simply be recharged. By so doing enough acid will be removed from the plates and introduced into the liquid so that the electrolyte density will be increased to give the proper gravity readings. This is on the assumption that the electrolyte in the cells was originally of the correct strength. If, after the battery has been given a long, slow charge, the cells fail to show the full charge gravity reading of 1280, you better have the battery examined at a service station. We advise you not to add acid to the cells as this is usually unnecessary and may be very detrimental to the plates.

EVEN SHORT RUNS CAUSE OVERHEATING

J. K. writes: Whenever I run my car, if for only five minutes, the engine gets hot and the water in the radiator starts to boil. Can you tell me the cause of this? Answer: There are the most likely causes: Radiator badly stopped up with sediment, so that some parts of it have little or no circulation and so that the passages that are open are so badly incrustated on the inside that they let through but little heat. Fan not running at its usual speed, owing to looseness of its belt. Reduction of the rate of water circulation by obstruction offered by rubber connections that have partly closed up.

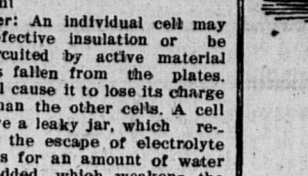
