SHOULD ASK ROYALTIES ON WORK BROADCASTED

LONDON, May 29—George Bernard Shaw told the Society of Authors, Playwrights and Composers yesterday that they would be "black legs" if they permit broadcasting companies to send out their works without payment of royalties. The companies claim they are not affected by the copyright law and offer authors nothing the first time a story is sent out and 5 per cent thereafter. Shaw declares publishers' contracts safeguard "all mechanical rights," and added "I myself think any author who does something for nothing is a traitor to his class interests."

He suggested it would be worth the authors' while to erect their own wireless, keeping a man on night duty to see copyrights were not infringed, or the habit of broadcasting stories has come to stay. The society voted unanimously with Shaw.

DOMESTICS IN BRITAIN HENCEFORTH TO BE KNOWN AS HOUSE ASSISTANTS

LONDON, May 29—A committee of prominent women who have been investigating the servant question for the Ministry of Labor today made their report. Most of their findings supported the servants' grievances and recommended better treatment.

Mrs. S. Lee Strachey, wife of the editor of the Spectator, suggested English Universities give a domestic science degree for mistresses and servants, as "it would create mutual understanding and give the servant dignity, lack of which is the real reason for dislike of domestic service."

"If we call girls house assistants it would sound much better and give her a high status," another investigator thinks. "School training and the apprenticeship system in vogue in other trades, servants' social clubs, longer periods of leisure, less superior supervision from mistresses, not one kind of food for the family and poorer for the maid, less bullying" were the legitimate aims of servants as seen by another member of the committee.

The committee found British servants work from seven in the morning to ten at night. This was absolutely condemned. An eight-hour day with pay for overtime and Sunday afternoon and two evenings off a week would be fair, it was agreed.

TO ESTABLISH SHRINE IN MEMORY OF MARK TWAIN

FLORIDA, Mo., May 29—The plan to establish a Mark Twain Memorial Park here, where the humorist was born, has met with an encouraging response, according to officers of the Mark Twain State Memorial Park Association, which is fostering the movement.

The executive committee has set August as "Mark Twain month," and the first week in September as "Mark Twain week." All lovers of the famous humorist should read at least one of his books in August, the committee declared, and heads of schools will be asked to have some sort of memorial program on one day in "Mark Twain week."

M. A. Violette, owner of the home here in which Mark Twain was born, has promised to donate the house and its old-time curios to the association.

Mark Twain was born November 30, 1835, and in his autobiography he humorously speaks of Florida as having "two streets, each a couple of hundred yards long, the first of the avenues mere lanes, with rail fences and corn fields on either side." Florida, however, has grown into a neat little town, with all the usual business institutions.

The majority of members of the association are editors of newspapers in Missouri.

RUSSIA EXPORTING GRAIN

BERLIN, May 29—From thirty to 70 carloads of Russian grain are arriving at Revel daily for transshipment to Germany. The consignments are said to be parts of more than 30,000 tons stowed for this export. They consist mostly of wheat and rye.
