ADDRESS AND PRESENTATION On Sunday, February 27, 1927, the parishioners of St. Columba presented their pastor, Rev. R. J. McDonald with an address accompanied by a purse of one hundred and fifty dollars in gold.

The following is the address: Rev. R. J. McDonald, St. Columba, P. E. I.

Rev. Dear Father,—

Having recently heard your statement of the financial standing of our parish with the glad tidings that our debt is paid off, and a substantial amount to our credit, we felt that we would be remiss in our duty if we did not in some substantial way tender you our heartfelt appreciation of your endeavours in our behalf.

Nine years ago you came to us, a perfect stranger and to say the least the prospect then before you was discouraging. The church which we had labored to remodel, and complete, and which we all admired so well, had been recently burned to the ground, with a debt of some seven thousand dollars still unpaid. You immediately faced the situation with your well known perseverance and ability and gave your whole heart to the work before you, working, planning, urging, coaxing, and superintending the construction of our magnificent brick church, and as a result of your untiring zeal and ability we have our church completed exteriorly and the debt wiped out.

At the same time though labouring so hard for the construction of our church, you did not forget our spiritual welfare, and always by precept and example and by going into the highways and byways after the wayward leading them to penance, by visiting and consoling the sick and dying you have always done your duty as God's minister in truly Christian spirit.

Kindly accept the accompanying purse as a small token of our deep appreciation and esteem. That God may grant you long years to labor in His Vineyard, and that you may long enjoy the fruits of your labor, is the fervent wish of your parishioners.
