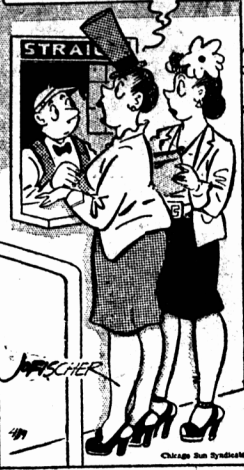

CHEESE AND EGG SAUCE

This sauce does more than just dress a vegetable or a bland dish of any kind; the milk, cheese and eggs in it provide a nice little bit of protein and with it an additional satisfying quality.

1 tablespoon shortening or five-flavored dripping
2 tablespoons flour
1/4 teaspoon salt
Few grains paprika
1 cup milk
1/3 cup shredded nippy cheese
1 hard-cooked egg, peeled and finely shredded or chopped

Melt the shortening or dripping in top of double boiler and blend in the flour, salt and paprika. Gradually stir in the milk. Cook over low direct heat, stirring constantly, until smoothly thickened.

Add the cheese and egg. Cover and heat over boiling water.

NYLONS MUST FIT PROPERLY

Timely advice comes from the manufacturers of full-fashioned nylons. They warn women who have been complaining about their new nylons being small in foot.

Actually, says a representative of the industry, "this is not the case. The new full-fashioned nylons are made to the correct size. However, during the war, women became accustomed to rayon and little hose, which have a tendency to stretch after washing and wearing. Hence, over a period of five years, most women have built up a very definite idea of hosiery size based on rayon standards."

Most retailers are advising women to buy a half size larger in nylons, with the result that they are not getting proper fit in nylon hose. "Bear in mind," he declared, "it is not only the length of the foot but also the heel fit which will determine the length of the foot. If the length of the foot is too long, the heel slips and will be pulled up too high and vice versa."

The answer to the problem lies apparently in making sure of foot sizes by measuring your own foot accurately. The length of the foot in inches, should be the size of your full-fashioned nylons. If your foot is very wide, however, you may prefer a hosiery in a half size larger; if very narrow, possibly a half size shorter would be a better fit. But to get the correct size in your glamorous full-fashioned nylon, bear in mind the length of your own foot measurement.

PLENTY OF COLOR IN SPRING FOOTWEAR

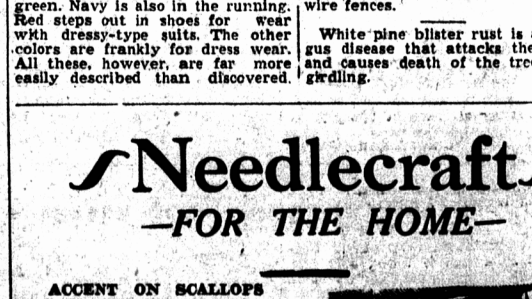

Origin of "Once Upon A Time"

The story of fairy tales is a fairy tale itself. Legend to the contrary, the most famous of these tales, the harmless nursery rhymes sung by a Mother Goose; actually, fairy tales have been called nature myths. The former symbolizes winter, liberation and spring awakening; the latter represents the awakening of day by night, which was the way of the ancients interpreted the setting of the sun.

The first "three wishes" story—wherein a foolish weaver causes all three wishes to be used without gain—is found in the Panschatantia, a collection of Sanskrit fables.

It tells of a stupid weaver who broke his loom and went to cut down a tree with which to repair it. A spirit in the tree cried out: "Spare this tree and I will grant you a wish!"

The weaver's wife advised him to wish for four hands and two heads, so that he could do double work and make more money. He did, and was immediately killed by the villagers as an ogre. "Cinderella" can be traced to 2200 B.C., the Sixth Egyptian Dynasty. It tells of a poor but beautiful girl, Rhodopis, who was bathing in the Meitteranean when a wind carried her fur sandal away, dropping it at students to believe they developed from some universal event.

How Can I!!!

Q. How can I shrink dress goods properly?

A. Place the goods folded in a tub of cold water, to which a few handfuls of salt have been added. After a few hours, hang on the line without unfolding. The weight of the salt prevents wrinkles from drying in, and also sets the color.

Q. How can I clean rice before cooking?

A. Place the rice in a strainer. Hold the strainer under a faucet and turn the water on full letting it run through the cereal. Then rub the rice between the hands, and rinse.

Q. How can I prevent water from trickling down my wrist when washing ceilings?

A. It is a good idea to tie a piece of absorbent rag around the wrist. This will catch the excess water.

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
