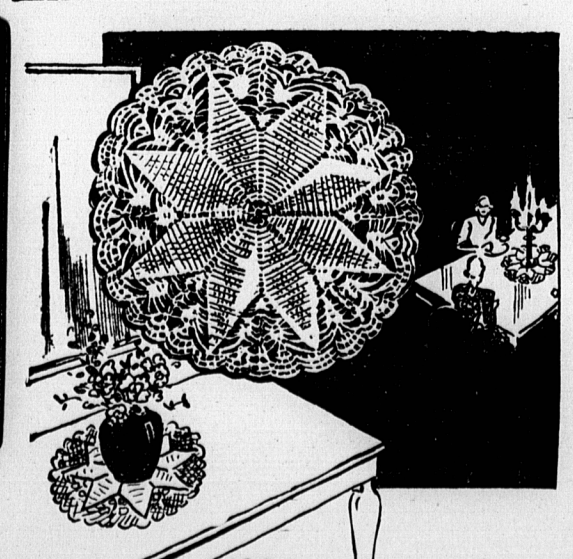

New Costume Jewelry You Can Make Quickly



Jingle Bracelet and Belt Set

The latest thing in sports accessories—tinkling little bells on your bracelet and belt. And it's so easy to make that you can make your own right at home—for yourself!

To make a gay jingle bell bracelet, you need 4 yards of red wool yarn, 30 small bells. Begin by cutting nine 14-inch pieces of yarn. Using each 3 pieces as a strand, start braiding.

At the end of 4 inches, string on 3 bells as our diagram shows—one through a single strand of each trio. Now braid again, adding 3 bells every 4-inch until all are used. Then, about 2-inch from each end, secure the braid with a few stitches with needle and yarn, cover with buttonhole stitches.

The belt? You quickly make it from a strip of brightly striped grosgrain ribbon, stitch on the bells.

And what a variety of other jewelry you can make—a "grape" boutonniere from ivory buttons, a "coral" necklace from popcorn.

DOROTHY DIX SAYS—GIVE HUSBAND THE CHILDREN AND DIVORCES WILL BE FEWER

Assuming All The Family Responsibility Will Make Man Think Twice

Dear Miss Dix—No story is commoner than that of the philandering husband who at middle age decides that his perfectly good wife is no longer his soul mate and brings some young girl in his life, and who insists upon his wife giving him a divorce. He always nobly presents the children to their mother, and having performed this act of generosity he washes his hands of all further responsibility about his offspring and leaves his discarded wife to wrestle with the problem of rearing and supporting them. The wife then summarily chucked out of house and home, she makes of this a friend of mine decided this problem. 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THE COOK'S CORNER

PEACH MERINGUE DESSERT

Two and one-half cups milk
Two-thirds cups breadcrumb
Few grains salt
3 egg yolks
4 tbsp. sugar
5 to 6 drops orange flower water (optional)

One-half cup peach juice
1 cup sliced, drained peaches
Meringue from 3 egg whites

Heat the milk and add the bread-crums and the salt. Beat the egg yolks and add the sugar and the orange flower water. Add some of the hot mixture to the egg yolks and then combine all. Add the peach juice and pour the mixture into a greased casserole. Bake in a 325 deg. F. oven till set. Place the casserole in a pan of hot water while in the oven.

Remove from the oven and spread the peaches over the baked custard. Make up a meringue by adding a few grains of salt to the egg whites and beating till frothy. Then add an eighth of a teaspoon of cream of tartar. Beat till they hold a peak then add 6 tbsp. sugar and one-half tsp. vanilla or one-quarter tsp. almond extract. Beat till well-blended. Pile on top of the peaches and return to the oven to cook the meringue. A 325 deg. F. oven for 15 to 20 minutes. Serves 6 to 8.

Serve with top milk.

CHERRY KISSES

2 egg whites
1-2 cup fine granulated sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
1 small bottle maraschino cherries

1 teaspoon juice from cherries

Method: Beat the egg whites until foamy, then sprinkle with the salt and continue beating until they are stiff but not dry. Gradually beat in the sugar and then add the cherry juice.

Place one or two on a teaspoon and lower into the meringue to coat them. Place on a well-buttered baking sheet and bake in a fairly slow oven (275 deg. F.) for about 10 minutes, to dry the meringue.

These should be a delicate pink in color. If the cherry juice doesn't color the meringue enough, you could add a drop or two of red coloring to it.

Sow Salpiglossis and Other Hardy Annuals Early

Hardy annual flowers may be sown in borders while the ground is still soft and frost still frequent. These hardy annuals are as likely to be injured by coddling as by neglect. They like to start growing in cool moist weather; they do not like to be covered too deeply when sown, and they need to be given plenty of room to develop.

If you have borders which were cultivated and cleaned up last fall in which you want annuals to grow to provide summer bloom when perennial flowers get scarce, you may scatter seeds of hardy annuals now and they will find cover in the soil and germinate under the best conditions. If the plants are too thick when they come up they must be thinned, but the excess plants may be moved to another location.

Salpiglossis is one of the hardy annuals which may have trouble growing and the usual difficulty is too much crowding and coddling. If you sow salpiglossis in the vegetable or cutting garden in a row, like radishes, giving it an early start and thinning out the plants, it will reward you with a gorgeous crop of flowers lasting throughout the summer. It needs only the sort of cultivation you give vegetables. Sown in the border, it needs the full sun and dislikes company. Generous plantations in fairly large open places in the border are most likely to succeed.

What are the hardy annuals? There are several thousand of them and a complete list is impossible here. But every flower seed packet should state whether the subject is hardy. Of course if you sow seed in the border, you should make a note of it and see that when the seedlings come up they are not ruthlessly destroyed by careless cultivation. There should be something to mark the spot so the hired man will take warning also.
