R. C. M. P. Counsel Deny Alleged Application Of Third Degree Methods

(C. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) — MONTREAL, Jan. 14. — Defence charges that Royal Canadian Mounted Police had used third degree methods on Mrs. E. Caroline Halifax and one auditor H. G. Norman, a witness, featured today's session in the preliminary hearing of a C. M. P. complaint against 62 persons accused of conspiracy to defraud the Dominion and Quebec governments out of more than \$5,000,000 in taxes through liquor smuggling.

John Fenwick, K.C. and James Crankshaw, special Crown prosecutor categorically denied the allegations of defence counsel. A brilliant array of defence counsel immediately returned to an assault on the validity of count number five in the conspiracy charge, accusing the defendants of conspiring to introduce alcoholic liquor into foreign countries wherein such importation is forbidden by law. The Crown Counsel were unprepared for detailed argument, so Judge Jules Desmarais adjourned the hearing until tomorrow.

No fresh evidence was introduced today. A group of 40 accused from the Maritime Provinces and one from British Columbia were sent home Friday until Feb. 11. The hearing this week concerned Sam, Allan, Harry, and Abe Bronfman, Montreal distillers, David Costley, Barney Aaron, and F. S. Blair, all of Montreal and Mrs. Caroline.

HELD FOR KIDNAPPING

Labatt Suspect Picked Up In Covington, Kentucky.

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire) — COVINGTON, Ky., Jan. 14.—Arrested on an Ontario warrant charging the kidnaping of John S. Labatt, wealthy London, Ont. brewer, a prisoner who identified himself as Kingston P. Murray, 34, pleaded not guilty a few hours later.

An agent of the division of investigation, United States Department of Justice, nabbed him on a street corner. He offered no resistance.

Arraigned before U. S. Commissioner Edward Pflueger he entered his plea and officers were ordered to take him to the Covington jail in lieu of \$50,000 bond. A hearing was set for Jan. 23, on the question of his removal to Canada.

The prisoner, known as "Piccolo Pete," fair tall, thin-faced, his hair thinning back from his forehead, contended he had not been out of Covington for "five or six years," and so could not have been near London last Aug. 14 when the kidnaping occurred.

Girl Awarded For Bravest Act of 1934

Miss Christine Stewart, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. John A. Stewart, Chulodden, P.E.I., employed by Dr. James L. Gamble, 33 Edge Hill Road, Brookline, Mass., has received two awards for her bravery in rescuing a woman from drowning in the heavy surf of Bar Harbour, Me., last August. The rescue was characterized by Ellery H. Clark, of the Massachusetts Humane Society, as "the bravest act of the year 1934."

Miss Stewart, sister-in-law of Lieut. Thomas J. Hill has been awarded the gold medal of the Life Saving Benevolent Association of New York and \$300, and the William Penn Harding award of \$50 with silver medal from the Massachusetts Humane Society.

Aug. 3, last, at Thunder Hole, on the ocean front at Bar Harbour, Miss Emily McDougall of 22 High St. Brookline, was swept from a rock on the shore during the height of a storm. Miss Stewart swam to her assistance, and held her up until both were assisted from the water by police.

The Bar Harbour Selectmen placed the facts relative to the rescue before the trustees of the two societies.

Herbert L. Satterlee, president of the New York Society, wrote: "Miss Stewart has received the award because she instantly plunged into the surf and swam to the assistance of a drowning woman, placing her own life in peril because of the rocks and heavy sea."

"According to the testimony the drowning woman convulsively seized her and she had to break the hold before she could assist her."

"She could not bring the woman to shore because of the treacherous undertow, but supported the woman in the water for 40 minutes until both were pulled to the rocks by a policeman, lashed to a rope held by other policemen on shore."

Mr. Clark of the Massachusetts organization stated: "The trustees of this society considered the rescue by Miss Stewart the bravest act of 1934. I am sending her the award with my sincere congratulations."
