The deceased had been ill for nearly a year, and had carried on a lumbering and mill business for some years, and was respected by every person for his sterling business qualities. The deceased is, we understand, a cousin of Mrs. D. M. McIntyre, of Charlottetown.

REV. Wm. A. Thomas in writing the Wesleyan says:—The Lord has blessed us here during this year. Congregations at all appointments are large and the interest sustained. In special services at Margate in January, seven decided for Christ and have entered church fellowship. Three weeks' efforts at Kingston bore fruit. At Clinton, through four weeks, the Lord's power was manifest. Thirty one people professed to receive a change of heart, and twenty seven have been admitted with probationary membership.

THE funeral of the late ex-Governor Howlan will be held this morning. At 6 o'clock the body will be privately removed to St. Dunstan's Cathedral, where a High Mass of Requiem will be sung at half-past six by Rev. Dr. Morrison. At twenty minutes after seven o'clock, the funeral will leave the Cathedral for the railway station. The body will be taken to Summerside by the regular train, and from Summerside it will be conveyed to Tignish by a special. His Lordship Bishop McDonald will officiate at the burial service at Tignish.

EARLY in June Mr. C. E. T. Jarvis expert insurance man will visit the city at the instigation of the Prince Edward Island Board of Fire Underwriters and will re-rate the city and the principal towns of the Province. THE GUARDIAN understands that there will not be a large general increase in the insurance rates as rumored. A small advance will, however, be made to cover the tax placed by the local Government and the lack of an inspector of the proper placing of electric light and other lines. The movement is also necessitated by the new buildings constructed of late and changes in those already covered by insurance.

The remainder of the evening was enjoyably spent in dancing when, after wishing Mr. Newsome continued success, the guests departed to their homes. Great credit is due to Mr. A. T. IAN of the death of his brother Archibald J., who was accidentally killed in a mining camp at Silverton, Colorado, on April 23rd. Deceased was quietly sleeping in his bed, when a boulder from a precipice near by crashed into his tent and struck him, causing instant death. His brother Donald who was sleeping in his berth above, escaped with a few slight wounds. Deceased was 45 years of age and unmarried. He was the son of Allan Livingston, New Dominion, and left for Colorado 20 years ago where he had carried on mining successfully. This fall he had intended to wind up his business there and return to the Island. On the very morning of the accident he had received a letter announcing the death of his brother, at New Dominion. Six brothers, Donald at Silverton, Colorado; Allan, on the homestead; David, in this city; Hugh and Alexander, in East Boston; John in Worcester, [and one sister, Mrs. A. S. McNeill, at the Block House are left to mourn.

MR. O'Reilly, W. S. Lounson, P. P. Gillis, R. B. Norton, Milton Walsh, S. A. McDonald, Ewen Cameron and others. The class did not, however, yield readily to influence, and there seemed an active resistance to the will of the operator. Some progress was, however made with three or four of the new subjects. A number of the others were sent down. The small class who came to town with the Hypnotist were under his absolute control and could be made to do or imagine anything. They imagined funny scenes and laughed uproariously and the next moment wept over suggested tragedies; they witnessed imaginary games; they were insensible to pain when their hands were pierced entirely through with pins; they sold imaginary pop corn among the audience, and did anything the operator willed. Possibly the play of Trilby and memories of the uncanny Svengali may have lingered in some minds as unpleasant feature of hypnotism, put it is a pleasing and attractive science that McEwen practices, and his work in other Canadian cities has demonstrated that he is one of its greatest living exponents. Doubtless we shall see the same marvellous results here in the evenings to come. There are no unpleasant or painful features in Mr. McEwen's entertainments which are free from vulgarity and afford an attractive study to persons of an investigating turn of mind, with lots of fun for all.
