THE TANK UNDER WAY

The continuous racket of riveting hammers is audible for a considerable distance over the city for the past few days, and comes from the tank siding of the Imperial Oil Company where the big 1,000,000 gallon tank is being erected. The noise in the vicinity of the tank is overwhelming and effectively prevented a Guardian representative yesterday from hearing the no doubt interesting answers returned to his shouted queries about the progress of the work by Mr. Abraham, the foreman in charge. The job is well under way now, though it is doubtful if it can be completed in eighteen days, as first estimated. A steam hoist raises the huge steel plates to the height desired, where they rest upon a trolley balanced on the rim of the tank and are wheel ed into place by the exerted labor of eight men. The hardest part of the job is yet to be done, in the laying and riveting of the roofing plates. Another tedious job will be the filling of the tank with city water for testing purposes.
