A GUARDIAN correspondent writing from New York says:—I had occasion to attend an installation at Pyramid Lodge of Odd Fellows which meets at Grand Opera House Building, a few nights ago. I found that the District Deputy was a P. E. Islander Chas Crozier, formerly of Alberton. He is one of a family of nine brothers, one of them Leonard Crozier (Frank Albert) who won the six day championship in bicycle race in Madison Sq. Garden here several years ago. I called on Dr. James Bruce of Everett Mass this week. He formerly lived at Grand View, P. E. Island; he had been on the Island the past summer and afterwards took a trip out to British Columbia and down the Pacific Coast as far as Santa Barbara. A few evenings ago he attended in Boston a banquet given to the medical faculty and students of the N. Y. Medical College. He was appointed chairman for the occasion. He is also chairman of the Public School Board of Everett. Miss Jane Allen, Charlottetown, a graduate of Massachusetts' Center Hospital and City Hospitals, Boston, attends to Dr. Bruce's cases, as nurse.

The members of the Mock Parliament at St. Dunstan's College met for the second time on Thursday evening Jan. 18th. The speaker having taken the chair, the clerk read the bill pertaining to Capital Punishment the second time. The House was then, on motion, resolved into a committee of the whole and Howard McDonald, the member for Kingston, was called to the chair. B. L. Cahill, the leader of the Government, then spoke on the bill before the House and in a clear logical speech advanced the policy of the Government, containing the present system of Capital Punishment and advocating life imprisonment in its stead. The leader was ably supported by Hon. Joseph E. Gillis (Vancouver), Hon. A. Doyle (Truro), Hon. Wm. Hughes (Hamilton) and Hon. Raymond Gillis (Montreal). Austin Bradley, the leader of the opposition, vigorously defended our present system of Capital Punishment and was supported by John Quinn (Halifax) and other members of the opposition. The speaker then took the chair and ordered the bill to be read a third time at the next meeting of the House. On motion the House then adjourned to meet again on Thursday Jan. 25th, when a bill appropriating \$3,000,000 for ten consecutive years for the building of a Canadian navy will be discussed.

Synopsis of Canadian North-West Homestead Regulations.

ANY even numbered section of Dominion Lands in Manitoba or the North-west Provinces, excepting 8 and 28, not reserved may be homesteaded by any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years of age, to the extent of one-quarter section of 160 acres, more or less.

Entry may be made personally at the local land office for the district in which the land is situated, or if the homesteader desires, he may, on application to the Minister of the Interior, Ottawa, the Commissioner of Immigration, Winnipeg, or the local agent receive authority for some one to make entry for him.

The homesteader is required to perform the conditions connected therewith under one of the following plans:

(1) At least six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each year for three years.

(2) If the father or mother, if the father is deceased) of the homesteader resides upon a farm in the vicinity of the land entered for the requirements as to residence may be satisfied by such person residing with the father or mother.

Six months' notice in writing should be given to the Commissioner of Dominion Lands at Ottawa of intention to apply for patent. W. W. CORY, Deputy of the Minister of the Interior.
