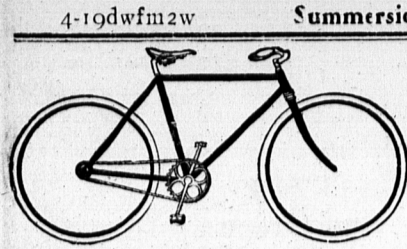

—A special collection was taken in the Presbyterian Church, Summerside, on Sunday last in aid of the China Famine Fund, the amount raised being in the vicinity of \$45, which, with the amounts secured from this congregation since then brings the amount up to \$62.—S.

—The Alberton Cheese Factory Co., having installed a butter plant last fall which gave perfect satisfaction, will commence work again in a few days and will continue to make butter till about the 1st. June, when the manufacturing of cheese will be resumed. Peter Burke, the efficient manager, will have charge of both plants again this year.—A.

—The Summerside harbor is now entirely clear of ice, the north-easterly wind and accompanying high tide breaking the barrier at the entrance of the harbor yesterday afternoon. About noon the wind began to freshen up and when the tide started to run out about an hour later the ice from up the river came down with a rush carrying practically all the ice in the harbor out with it. The schooner Telephone, which was moored at the wharf, was carried out into the channel almost opposite the town wharf before she was with considerable difficulty cut out and towed back to the Railway wharf. The schooner Enterprise moored in the ice at the east of the Railway wharf was caught in the rush and carried out nearly to the channel. With the exception of some ice around the shore and between the wharves is as clear as in summer and as Pt. Du Chene harbor has been reported open a week, it may be expected that the Empire will start the summer service soon.—S.

—Three motor craft that are about completed at Alberton North will be a valuable addition to the large number now in use about Casumpec Harbor. Charles Gallant, our veteran pilot, is responsible for one, the model of which is of his own idea. This motor boat is 28 feet over all, 18 feet keel and will have a draft of about 2 feet. She is smooth planked and has the appearance of being a speedy craft. Mr. Gallant gave his personal attention to the building of his little boat which is proof that the work is of the best. Another boat of about the same dimensions, only a little wider and shallower, has been built by Capt. Daniel Fraser for his own use at lobster and mackerel fishing, which promises well to carry out the intentions of the builder for general purpose motor. She is planked smooth with cedar and will be powered with a Bruce Stewart engine. The finishing of this boat is receiving special attention. Then another motor craft in the style of a gull boat which was planked by H. W. Adams for Capt. John Champion is indeed much admired, the work being done in a non-critical way. Mr. Champion will use this boat on his annual trip to the Magdalen Islands for herring and it has been built especially strong to withstand the roughness of that trip. She will be fitted with a Lathrop engine.—A.
