**PLAN FOR THE REGULATION OF MEAT IMPORTS**

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, May 14—A plan for the regulation of meat imports into Great Britain to be submitted to the British Government as an important part of the British policy to be pursued at the forthcoming Imperial Economic Conference at Ottawa, has been drawn up by a group of Dominion meat producers in Australia, New Zealand and Canada, and by importers in the United Kingdom. It was announced today at the offices of the Montreal Board of Trade. The scheme provides for a tariff on foreign beef, mutton, lamb, veal, bacon and ham, with preferences for the Dominions, as follows:

- 1—The full foreign tariff is fixed at 1-1-2 D. (3 cents) a pound on all imports save lamb, on which the tariff on foreign imports would be 2D. (four cents) a pound.
- 2—Where a preferential trade agreement is reached with a foreign country, the tariff on foreign imports of meat would be reduced to 3-4D. (1-1-2 cents) a pound, with 1D. (2 cents) a pound on lamb.
- 3—A tariff of 1-2D. (one cent) a pound is proposed on all meat imported from the Dominions unless there are reciprocal trade agreements, when the meat would be tariff free.

The scheme is expected to be adopted by the Dominion governments. It is also expected to obtain benefits for British export trade as a result of the Dominion preferences. Canada is also vitally interested in the scheme, it was pointed out, particularly in view of the fact that her exports of fresh, chilled and frozen beef have dropped since 1929. In that year, the Dominion exported a total of \$4,652,181 worth of fresh, chilled and frozen beef. In 1930, this figure dropped to a total of \$1,250,000 worth, while last year it reached the low level of \$1,000,000.

**MRS. HENRY JARDINE**

**CHURCH SERVICES**

**THE BAPTIST CHURCH**

Continuing the series of sermons on the "Seven Churches" the Rev. A. C. Vincent spoke yesterday morning on Sardis, the church that had declined from her high estate by compromise with the world. Located in a wealthy, beautiful, sophisticated metropolis the Christian Society here had to a large degree lost its first love, its vital enthusiasm, its healing message. "I know thy works, that thou hast a name that thou livest, and thou art dead." Almost unmitigated condemnation was the message to Sardis, she had organization, activity, appearance, everything but the one thing needful—life. Apparently Sardis suffered from no persecution, perhaps her conditions were too easy and pleasant, she had come to the point where there was little distinction between her people and the surrounding groups of the better behaved pagans. Instead of being a power, a vital influence, an uplifting factor "for I have found no works of thine fulfilled before my God."

"Repent—for I come!" Emphasis is laid in all these messages on the coming of the Lord, and emphasis that is in these days needed as it was in Sardis. What would be our attitude, our activity if this vision were ever before us today? "Thou hast a few—they shall walk with me in white," even there, were found some who had not defiled their garments, a seed and promise of hope which in all generations has been preserved. To him that overcometh still was offered the white robe of purity, the assurance of preservation, the triumphant honour of confession before the Father.

In his evening sermon Dr. Vincent spoke on "A nickname accepted setting forth in a very eloquent address the way in which a name offered in contempt two millenniums ago, clothed itself finally in glory.
