Mrs John A. Croken, City has received the following letter from her son now in France:

J. F. Croken,
26th Battalion H. Q. S.,
2nd B. E. F., France.

My Dear Mother:— Once more I take the pleasure of writing you a few lines in answer to your most welcome letter which came to hand the other day. Was glad to hear from you after such a long time, but I know it wasn't your fault as there are many letters sent to me that I never receive and I guess it is the same way with you. I received a letter from brother Amby after it came over to France and was returned to him, so there are mistakes, made sometimes. I wrote Della Clarke but she says she didn't get it. Well dear mother you told me that had gone West again, also Rudolph gone away, I am sure you must be lonesome but cheer up there is no good in worrying. The war won't last much longer and we will be all home again if God spares us and if misfortune overtakes us then I trust we will meet in that better land above so cheer up and don't worry. Well mother I hear Eugene is in England. I would like to see him but it seems impossible at present, however I may get a pass to England when I will get to see him. I have not seen Urban Bradley for a long time but hear he is all right and is in the machine gun section of the 14th Battalion, neither have I seen Ray Sullivan, but was talking to Billy McLaren about two months ago when he was looking fine. I had a McMillan fellow from Hunter River to see me. He's now in the 5th Battalion. Amby and Ed said they were going to send me some tobacco but I haven't received it yet. Tell May Reardon to get busy and send me a box of sweets as I would like a feed of something good to eat. Tell her to put it in a tin box and sew it up with canvas so it cannot get broken.

Well dear mother I think I will have to close hoping to hear from you soon. Your loving son,
