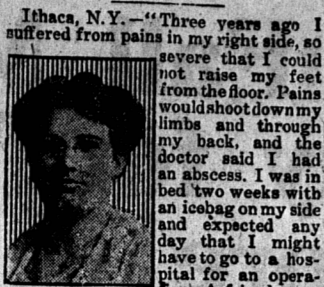

**PLANNING TO AID MEN STRANDED IN THE OLD COUNTRY**

LONDON, Oct. 29.—There are in Britain now, according to the civil re-estabishment office about one thousand discharged Canadian soldiers, or four per cent of all those left in the country. These men are anxious to return to Canada.

The majority of them are unable to find work here. Many others, owing to their discharge here, owing to the fact that their families were unable to accompany them when they were ready for repatriation.

Although no soldier could legally obtain his discharge without absolute proof that he had the means of obtaining a livelihood here, many, wishing to stay, evaded this rule by the production of false certificates purporting to be from their employers. It is also alleged that the demobilization officers at some of the camps have not been as strict as they might have been.

**AMPUTATION CASES SUFFER**

Thus many men applying for repatriation now have only themselves to blame for the situation in which they find themselves.

The amputation cases are the most unfortunate, as, by arrangement, the Canadian Government attends to the British cases in Canada and the British Government, the Canadian here. The British system is said to be less efficient than the Canadian and as the British patients get the preference it sometimes takes weeks for a Canadian to receive treatment.

The re-establishment offices are doing all in their power to remedy this injustice.

**PLAN TO AID MEN**

The situation as regards the discharged men wishing repatriation is more difficult. Many are deservingly cases, some having a guarantee of a good job, but finding when they are discharged that the job is gone because of the delay in demobilization.

The military authorities can do nothing as the men are no longer in the army. The High Commissioner has a small fund, but cannot meet nearly all the calls.

Efforts are now being made to obtain a ruling by which these men will be assisted.

We bid you a sincere good bye and ask you to treasure the accompanying gift with the same effectual remembrance as it is here presented.

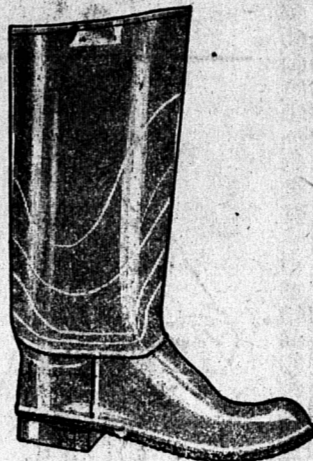

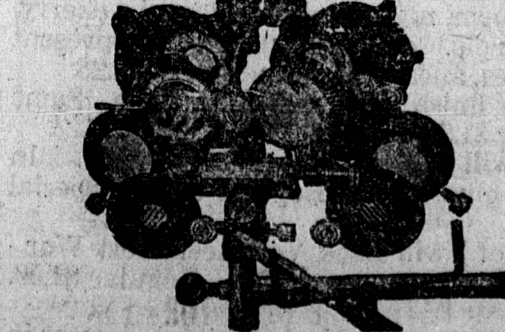
