

Great Revival In P.E. Island Hockey

Famous Abegweits, After Slump of Years, Again in The Running For Maritime Honors.

HALIFAX, N. S., Jan. 30.—(By W. J. Foley, Canadian Press Sports Writer)—Hockey in Prince Edward Island is returning to the high standard maintained by the Charlottetown Abegweits of a few years ago, when they ruled the Maritime Provinces in the Simon pure game for two seasons, and in two years' campaigning met defeat only twice.

When Sugar Gordon, Stonewall Morgan, McEachern, Frowse, Moore, Fred Kelly and other members of that famous Abbies team of seven or eight years ago reached retirement age, the Abegweits went into a rut which persisted until the younger Abbies came along to take their places. For a while the members of the Old Guard, dwindling in number each season, kept going with a sprinkling of the younger element. Finally the Abbies all but passed out of the picture and the Summerside Crystals, who have not really figured in the Maritime hockey world in years, won with alarming regularity.

The 1930 Abegweits, with youth and speed, and gaining in experience in each game, are trailing the Summerside Crystals in the greatest fight for Island supremacy of late years. The Abbies are not ripe to step into championship play this season but followers of the game see a rosy future for the young Abegweits.

With the departure of Gordon, Morgan, Moore, Kelly the Island followers shook their heads and bemoaned that there would never be other Kellys, Moores and Morgans. The showing of the 1930 Abbies has dispelled this gloom and Island hockey men can now look forward to seeing the famous Abegweits Club carried to the front in Maritime amateur hockey circles. Maybe not this season and maybe not next, but eventually the Abbies are sure to reach their goal.

Abegweits have developed several promising youngsters this year and Coach Roy Frowse, a former star, is proud of Acorn, Nicholson, McEwen, Lawlor, Power, Saunders and others.

Summerside Crystals also have some promising material but, since the Crystals never attained the fame that was the Abbies in amateur hockey, their winning streak of late years has not held the interest of hockey fans as has the rapid improvement of the young Charlottetown team. Crystals have had many hockey stars. One forward, Charles Cahill, is at present playing professional hockey across the border. Others have also attained fame, but the Summerside teams have not reached the pinnacle as did the Abegweits.

New Brunswick and Nova Scotia clubs, which have not considered the Island threat very seriously of late, are watching with interest the development of the Charlottetown team. Charlottetown hockey fans are just beginning to realize that hockey stars can always be replaced. It may take years in the development but it is sure to come with the proper coaching. And the Abbies, for the first time, are seeking the proper coaching. It is predicted that the Abegweits will have an Upper Canadian expert in charge next season.

JUDGEMENT GIVEN—A great deal of interest has been taken in two appeal cases heard in Summerside before Judge Arsenault at the last November term of the Supreme Court. These appeals were taken by the Department of Marine and Fisheries from the decision of Stipendiary Magistrate J. R. Wyatt. Information was laid by Radio Inspector Nolan, acting for the Department of Marine and Fisheries, against several local parties for operating radio receiving sets without having been granted a license therefore by the Radiotelegraph branch of the Department of Marine and Fisheries, contrary to statute. The cases were dismissed by Stipendiary Magistrate Wyatt and the Department then appealed to the Supreme Court. The statute in question was 3 and 4 George V. Cap. 42 and the cases were in the nature of test cases, the first brought in this province. Judge Arsenault sustained the appeal reversing the decision of Magistrate Wyatt, holding that radio receiving sets come within the provisions of the Act and that the owner of a radio receiving set is subject to the license fee of \$1.00 provided by the Act. Judgement was delivered in Charlottetown on Tuesday last.

Cavendish Girl also had a few disadvantages to overcome—her owner's first fast drive for a number of years except behind a windshield. Wonderful credit is due Mr. Laird for both pluck and sport. Lindy, the only square trotter in the four, was handicapped in getting in his clip on the short score, the finish on the third explains his ability.

The starters bell called three to the 250 class, namely, Ethel Todd, Soldier Guy and Chestnut Prince, the latter winning out in splendid form. Prince is a perfect galloped pacer according to most horse critics and a son of Watson Peter by Peter the Great. His dam is Queen Katherine from June Morning. Prince looks to be equally as good as Queen Katherine, and she went some in her day. Ethel Todd, coming a close second in the third heat, put on one of her unsightly rustles and noed him out at the wire. Soldier Guy displayed plenty of pep and speed but very unsteady, some little things merely overlooked.
