Broad as an example of successful consolidation.
Mr Justice Hazard said the crisis to the history of the school had arrived as far as the future was concerned. He thought it an easy matter to arrange for transportation of pupils and spoke of the advantages derived from such a school not to be had in the ordinary district which was without such an organization.
Mr Justice Fitzgerald also made reference to the value of consolidation and the standing of P. E. Islanders in education.
Premier Palmer considered it an important question. He said it was the people's question; there was a difference of opinion as to the value of consolidation, some thought it good, some thought otherwise. The people must decide.
W. S. Stewart offered \$25 a year for five years for running expenses of the school. If practicable this might be used for prizes for the pupils.
Hazard would contribute \$50 annually for three years toward its support.
Other speakers were: Hon Mr Crosby, Hon Mr McDonald, J. D. Seaman, Rev E. E. Styles, Mr Corish, Hammond Kelly, and Sampson Farquharson.
The following resolution was moved by Percy Mutch, seconded by Finlay MacPhail and carried:
Resolved, that this meeting recommend the board of the Hillsboro school to select a representative man in each of the six districts to take part in the ordinary district meeting to get a majority of the voters' names appended calling a special meeting to vote on the continuation of the school on the following basis:
First—40c on the 100 Government valuation.
Second—Parents outside the mile limit getting their children to school.
Third—\$3.00 fee on the first two children in each family within a mile radius.
One representative from each of the six districts was selected to form a committee to canvass his district.
Mrs Austin Judson's very generous contribution "Bonnie Mary of Argyle" was a pleasing feature of the meeting.

William Bustard, formerly of Boston. So deep was this gloom that the blazing rocks, which trailed the other at all points of the compass could not penetrate it. The richest man of the world is not pleased with the knowledge that he cannot "come back" on the links.
Rockefeller had hopes this morning He had been after his pastor's scalp ever since he came here from his Tarrytown home, and each time that the two have met on the links Mr. Bustard has won out with a tantalizing lead. John D. practised early and late, but to no avail.
Today being the biggest athletic occasion of the year, the old king decided he would put on the high speed for one grand win and then rest upon his laurels.
Somehow or other the same idea was nurtured by the Rev. Mr. Bustard and preacher and rich man met on the links with clashing purposes. They played with a vim unequalled by former contests this season. John D. and his pastor sweated with the freedom of pudders in a steel mill. When it was all over Rockefeller was loser.

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FRIENDLY NOTE TO HAYTI

WASHINGTON, July 6—The joint note presented to the Haytian Government by the United States, Great Britain, France, Germany and Italy, requesting an adjustment of the claims of their citizens is not an ultimatum, it is declared at the State Department, but a friendly request to conclude the long standing question by diplomacy or arbitration. The Haytian Government itself, it is added, suggests this procedure in order to conclude the matter as speedily as possible. The United States, therefore has joined hands with the European Governments, in a note that asks that the claims be settled diplomatically within three months or in the event of the failure of that course that they be referred to arbitration. Although Hayti has not looked with favor upon a proposition to refer the matter to a claims commission, that course would be the ultimate outcome in case the suggested diplomatic negotiations fail. Several months ago the Central Bank of Hayti was reorganized with American controlling fifty per cent. of the stock. This institution was to have taken over the bonded indebtedness of Hayti and effected a settlement. The Haytian Government, however, seemed disposed to scale down the price suggested for the bonds and so far it has not been possible to reach an agreement with the nations whose citizens hold the securities.
