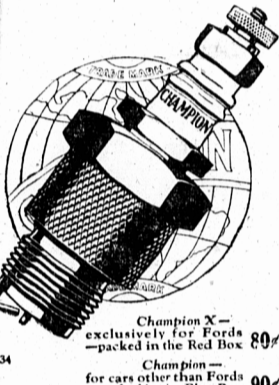

### Planting Trees On Prairie Acres

(Canadian Press)

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 7.—Mapping the spread of trees in the prairie provinces, with the object of ascertaining the rate at which that spread goes on, is one of the latest activities in which Prof. V. W. Jackson, of the University of Alberta, is engaged.

The mapping is being done in connection with a systematic campaign to have more of the prairie covered with trees than is at present the case, and yet in no way interfere with agricultural development.

With the exception of comparative narrow strips of land along the banks of rivers, streams and lakes, the prairies were treeless up to the last century, according to Prof. Jackson, who quotes Lawrence, the first white man to explore western Canada, as being surprised at the lack of foliage on the western plains. Now this area is well treed.

So far, the spread of the poplar has been the most remarkable to be noted, Prof. Jackson points out. All through Saskatchewan "poplar islands" are forming and increasing in size, and it appears that the poplar spreads as rapidly as new land is broken for agricultural purposes. It is only a matter of a few generations until there will be no such thing as a treeless stretch of prairie of any great extent, Prof. Jackson states.

While the poplar is easily first in the way it adapts itself to the conditions of the prairies, satisfactory results are also being obtained with oak and elm. Acorns which have been sent to Red Deer, Alta., have germinated and the saplings give promise of developing into lovely trees. Elm seeds, have also been planted in Alberta and likewise germinated. The progress of these saplings are being closely watched.

### Rockefeller Association To Advance Its Work

MONTREAL, Que., Oct. 8.—In recognition of the high quality of the work being done in this city by the Child Welfare Association of Montreal, the Rockefeller Foundation has given that organization a grant of \$15,000, to enable the officials to delegate one of the nurses on their staff to pursue a special advanced course of training which has as its object the solution of many problems with which mothering children are faced in the care of their young children.

While the supervision of children has been directed to saving lives among children of pre-school age, and has shown striking results in decreasing infant mortality and preventing diseases, physicians, nurses and mothers have found themselves confronted with problems, with which no methods of coping have heretofore been available.

Thus, the doctor may recommend vegetables and fruit, and the mother reports that she cannot induce the child to eat them. Or there may be difficulty in getting the child to sleep at the proper hour, or he may suffer from fear of the dark. These are only a few of the problems which constitute real difficulties to parents, and may have serious results in later life.

It is felt that a combination of the functions of public health nurse and social service worker with the complete knowledge of the child and of parents' problems will make a distinct advance upon the methods followed at present.

These methods inaugurated by Dr. Chandler, of this city, greatly interested the group of Rockefeller Foundation representatives, who watched intensive courses in child nursing being given to groups of mothers.

Miss Flora Stewart, who has been on the staff of the Child Welfare Association for the past four years, has been selected for the scholarship. She is a native of Scotland, and is a "Queen's Nurse," this corresponding to what is known here as a public health nurse.

**DR. E. O. MACDONALD**

GLACE BAY, N. S. Oct. 8.—Dr. E. O. MacDonald, well known medical practitioner here, died at his residence at New Aberdeen at 11:30 today after a long illness. He was a native of P. E. I., coming to Glace Bay as assistant to the late Dr. R. A. MacKeen shortly after his graduation a little over twenty years ago. He is survived by a wife and family, Mrs. MacDonald being a daughter of the late Dr. Hugh Cameron of Inverness.

### Indian Vote Figures in Alaska Election

JUNEAU, Oct. 8.—The charge that the votes of illiterate Indians have been marshalled to rule the white population of Alaska entered into the campaign for election of the territory's representative in Congress.

Dan A. Sutherland, republican of Juneau, the incumbent, has been the target of the attack against the Indian voters. He is opposed by Thomas A. Marquam, Fairbanks lawyer, running on an independent ticket. Frank A. Boyle of Juneau withdrew from the race after receiving the democratic nomination, and asked that his adherents vote for Marquam.

Indians for Sutherland  
Marquam is generally supported by republican federal office holders, who have charged that Sutherland betrayed his constituents by allowing reports of unrestrained vice in the territory, voiced in congress, to go unanswered.

Only in the first judicial district, which is the southeastern section of Alaska, have the Indians voted to any appreciable extent in past elections. Those who have voted supported Sutherland virtually to a man. Sutherland's opponents said that the Indians have been banded together by a half-breed for political purposes.

With the Eskimos of the northern part of the territory, the Indians comprise about 50 per cent. of the population.

### He Charges Conspiracy.

Sutherland has centred his attack on what he characterizes as a salmon fishing monopoly and to charging that federal office holders have conspired against him. He is seeking re-nomination of Alaskan officials who were involved in the vice charges.

Alaska is normally republican, but party lines have been forgotten many times in recent elections. Persons seeking election to the territorial legislature are doing so with their opposition or support of Sutherland as their chief issue.

The territory's only representation in congress is the one delegate, who may speak but has no vote.

### TEN MILLION DOLLARS DAMAGE TO CORN CROPS IN CENTRAL STATES

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 8.—Ten million dollars damage has been done the Illinois corn crop, Director Stanton of the State Department of Agriculture estimated today. Fifty,000 acres of corn, it is estimated, has been totally destroyed. Frost, ear worms and moth damage probably has made one-half of the Iowa corn crop unmerchantable, although it still retains much feeding value, Charles D. Reed, Director of the Weather and Crop Bureau here, said today. Continuation of the rainy weather, the report added, will cause serious damage and may reduce the 25 per cent. of the crop that normally goes to market.
