on small vessels to carry our Coal and take away our produce.

Some thirty years ago the ship building industry was the largest and most valuable asset of our Island trade, but for want of some protection and encouragement by the Government it has dwindled gradually away, and how there is not a vessel of any size owned in this Province.

I see the Newfoundland Government has passed an Act to help vessels built in that country. British Columbia has already started in to help their building, and I hope our Federal Govt. will aid those who are willing to put money in vessels that will benefit our people and Province.

Dear Sir,—We will take shares in one or two wooden vessels, providing the Government grants aid in the way of a bonus on somewhat similar lines as the Newfoundland Government. When our Province built and owned a Merchant Marine of its own, our products were carried to Britain and other countries in our own ships, manned by our own sailors. Today we have neither the ships or the sailors.

Both Governments have bonused other industries with good results which made employment for our own people.

Shipbuilding, if revived in our Province as formerly, would benefit all classes, our farmers in particular, by a home market which the workmen would make, and then vessels to carry their produce to market from our various ports.

Dear Sir,—In reply to your favor investing in wooden shipbuilding, I will only be too glad to do so and put money in a three hundred or four hundred ton schooner built in our Province, providing the Dominion Government grants a bonus of at least twenty dollars a ton to wooden ships similar to Newfoundland, when a Government is granting twenty dollars a ton—our Government should do better.—We have the material in this Province.

The building of these vessels would make employment for our own people particularly in winter, as well as our returned soldiers. Without such assistance this great industry could not survive, as what few old schooners we have are now being operated at a loss. Other great industries in Canada have been established and built up by bonusing, ships are needed and with Government aid to the builders can be operated profitably.

MR. PETER TRAINER SHIP CHANDLER

Dear Sir,—I am pleased to see that the Press, both Parties and the Boards of Trade, are backing up the bonusing of wooden shipbuilding. I will take one or two shares in a 250 or 300 ton wooden coasting schooner, built in Prince Edward Island, of our own wood, providing the Government grants a bonus of twenty dollars per ton, as without this I do not think it possible to revive the industry and make it a permanent and lasting business.

A Coasting vessel of above tonnage is very suitable for a certain amount of local trade, but is invaluable in Foreign Trade as well.

Take the one article of Salt alone as well as Hard Coal and Molasses, a great many cargoes were brought to our Island in Scandinavian, Russian, French and United States vessels. Some of these vessels run from 107,

175, 220 up to 500 tons. They then carried lumber back as return cargoes to the Motherland and our Allies.

We need a new fleet of smaller Coasting vessels from 40 to 100 tons—as the old ones are almost used up for our many shallow harbors.

I do not think that any other industry could be established on this Island so beneficial to the whole population. A 300 ton schooner built in our City would employ many of our laboring men in winter that are then idle and our employment would remain caulkers, carpenters and other skilled mechanics in our City and Province and keep them from emigrating and so help to make a home market for our farmers, and set in motion saw mills all over this Country that are now idle, and so manufacture our raw material into the furnished article—ships.

Messrs Dean & Stewart, Shipowners, Mt. Stewart, sail their own vessel part of the year.
