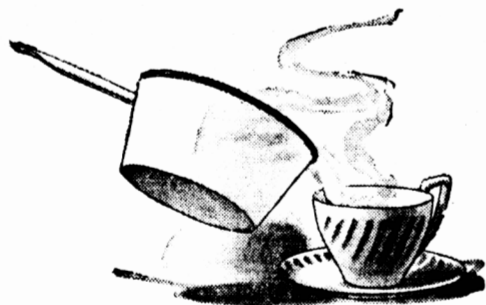

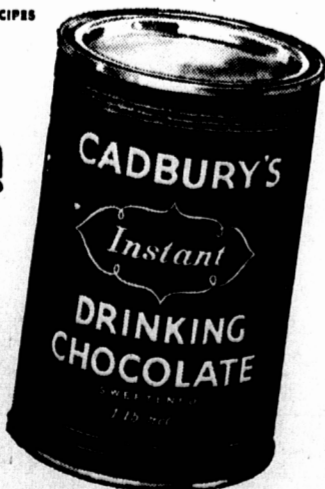

### Skipper's Heroism Lauded in Senate

OTTAWA, Feb. 2.—(CP)—Senator J.J. Kinley (L—Nova Scotia) lauded the heroism of a 22-year-old Lunenburg skipper today and told the Senate his action demonstrated the peril faced by Canada's east coast fishermen. He told the story of Capt. Land Luce who swam ashore through thundering Atlantic breakers with a line that enabled his seven crew members to reach shore safely from a disintegrating ship. Nova Scotia and Canada, said Senator Kinley, would be proud of him.
