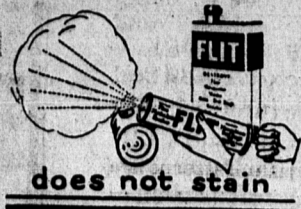

**Women Crooks Dupe Bargain Seekers**  
(By British United Press)  
LONDON, May 7.—Merseyside abounds with swindlers and tricksters, whose activities at the present time are causing the police to give considerable attention to the trade in fake jewellery. Women are prominent in this class of crime.  
The latest dodge which is being worked with considerable success is known among the criminals as the jaugoon touch. The jaugoon is a soft New Zealand stone, which in appearance, shape, and cut, is like a real diamond.  
They can be bought cheaply in fairly large quantities, but before they are used by the swindler they have to be dipped in specially-prepared liquid and baked. Then the jaugoon has all the appearance of a genuine diamond, and only an experienced jeweller can tell the difference.  
Night time is always chosen for this fraud. Then the jaugoon scintillates with the fire of a real diamond. It is generally sold as crook stuff, or stolen property, at anything upwards of a hundred times its real value.  
Large numbers of the stones are being sold and women are the chief agents. Their victims are for the most part of the sporting variety, who have won a few pounds at the races or in some venture.

**Cast Iron Trick That Often Works**  
(By British United Press)  
LONDON, May 7.—House detectives at all the big hotels in London and other important cities are now preparing for the confidence men, who emerge from their corners just before the flat-racing season begins.  
The foxy and public rooms of fashionable hotels are the happy hunting grounds of the racing crooks.  
But gradually, with police co-operation, officials are being put wise, and the confidence men are experiencing great difficulty in relating their pitches.  
The crook having "palled up" with his victim, invites him to have lunch. The conversation is turned to racing topics, and when the restaurant clock is a few minutes to half-past two, the crook explains that he has a very big commission to work and must get on the telephone to a couple of bookmakers.  
"As a matter of fact," he explains, "it's a cast-iron 'cert', and I am putting £2,000 on. The horse (he mentions its name) can't lose, it's the finest racing certainty of the season."  
He explains that the information comes straight from London, mentioning the name of a well-known sporting peer. "I dare say I could manage a few hundred for you—if you want to turn it into £5,000 or so, for the price is bound to be 5 or 6 to 1."  
The prospect of so good a profit usually prompts the victim to risk a substantial amount.  
They both go to the telephone box and the victim hears his companion ring up two numbers and back the horse.  
Soon the paper boys are heard shouting the result, and the "cast-iron 'cert'" is second.  
The explanation of the swindle is fairly simple. The crook has a confederate whose job it is to see that the clock in the restaurant is a few minutes slow.  
The moment the "first three" are announced he walks quickly back to the restaurant and casually passes the crook and his victim, such as the number of fingers used for rub-lub the chin or something equally simple—tells the crook which has won and which is second. The latter is named as his "cast-iron 'cert'."  
Operated by a spring motor, a decoy fish that swims with a life-like motion has been patented by a West Virginian, to attract living fish to baited hooks that it draws through water.

**MRS MORRIS SLICHTER IS NOW AT YUNNANFU**  
HONG KONG, China, May 7.—Mrs. Morris Slichter, widow of the China inland mission worker, the Rev. Morris Slichter of Toronto, her five-year-old son, John, and Miss Mary Craig, medical missionary of Philadelphia, all of whom were held by bandits, have been released and are now at Yunnan, says a wireless message from that city today.  
The release of the prisoners was negotiated by the Rev. Allen Cim, who made a hazardous journey in to the interior of the bandit area for that purpose. The party arrived at Yunnanfu on April 30.  
The body of Mr. Slichter and that of his 5-year-old daughter, both of whom were bayoneted by the bandits, were taken to Yunnanfu for burial.

**Find Foxes Work In Well With Farming Operations**  
TORONTO, May 9.—Two farmers in Durham County believe that they have solved the problem of turning their spare time into revenue. A mile south of the Village of Orono in Clarke township M. H. Staples and C. B. Sissons have established a small black fox ranch and after three years of experience claim that this new industry works in well with the operation of the average farm. They have found that the care of this new live stock does not seriously conflict with that necessary in handling a dairy herd and orchard, while the experience gained in raising ordinary domestic animals comes in handy when foxes are added to the establishment.  
On Well-drained Land.  
The owners live across the road from each other, but their foxes are all located on the Staples place. At the present time the ranch, which is simply a bit of well-drained, rather light land, a few yards behind the main farm buildings, boasts nine pairs of black foxes. Practically no pelts have been sold, so far, but the business is expected to reach the commercial stage this winter.  
"The ideal arrangement," stated Mr. Staples, when The Globe man called at the farm a few days ago, "would be to get a man to devote himself to the foxes, the garden and the poultry only. With these lines fairly well developed the three would keep an experienced chap busy the year round. We hope to effect an arrangement like this before long, though to date I have looked after the foxes and run my own farm as well."  
Must Have Good Stock.  
Mr. Staples strongly advised starting with good foxes. "It is a mistake," he pointed out, "to work with 'patches' or ordinary red foxes simply to get experience. The man who can look after cattle, hogs and horses, and every Ontario farmer is familiar with these animals, should start with a few good foxes. There is no market for any thing else."  
Not So Costly.  
This man did not find the cash outlay getting started into the new line exceptionally heavy. After the original breeding stock was purchased it was simply necessary to get wire netting, the farm supplying the ground, lumber and posts. The bill for the wire netting amounted to about \$600. A moderately quiet place was selected, about three hundred yards back from the road, and the pens erected in breeding units. These consist of one big run and two smaller ones, all connected with pens and tunnels. They are so arranged that the dog may be shut in one smaller pen and the mother and pups given the run of the other two. Later the mother can be shut off in the second smaller pen and the pups given the largest run. With connecting gates and wooden tunnels this shutting off of the various members of the family can be done without actually catching or touching the animals.
