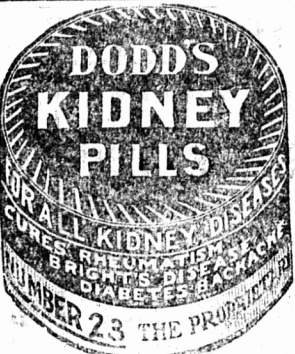

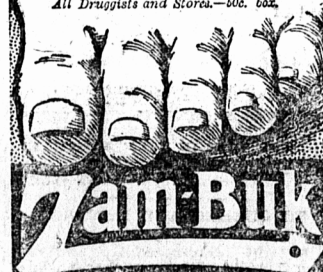

### CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

It is surprising the large number of people in Charlottetown who, when want to inquire about their Morning Daily Guardian or subscription, ask Central for the News phone No. 133, or for the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 132, or when they want to inquire about advertising ask Central for the Subscription Phone No. 132-2, or for the News Phone No. 132-3, instead of 132-2, or when they want the News or Editorial department ask Central for the Advertising Phone No. 132-3, instead of 132, although all those departments and their respective phone numbers are plainly given in the telephone book. Some people, instead of looking at the book, even phone one of the above departments to find out what number to ask for to get another department. All this is a great waste of time on the part of the person phoning, the operator at the Central, and the clerk in the Department wrongly phoned. The news staff, on an upper floor, cannot give the necessary information about either advertising or subscriptions, nor the advertising staff about subscriptions or news, nor the subscription staff about advertising or news. In other words the clerks know and can do but their own work in their own departments, and if it were otherwise they would be continually running from one department to another, up stairs and down, mixing work, wearing themselves out and causing the greatest possible confusion. On and after 7 p.m. daily it is useless to ask for any phone number except 133. Patrons who consult their phone books for the numbers they really want will greatly lessen the work of the patient Central telephone and Guardian clerks and thus help make their lives much brighter and happier.

### CUT THIS OUT AND PASTE IT UP

Almost every day The Guardian receives orders by mail to insert news matter of an advertising nature. In most of these cases the senders, who are frequently not known to any member of the staff and who have no account in the advertising department, write "Please insert the following and oblige," thus apparently implying that they think the items will be inserted free. Only a few weeks ago a reader wrote asking that his advertisement of Farm for Sale be inserted free from day to day until he cancelled it, as he is a subscriber to The Guardian. In this connection it may be said that the subscription price is not sufficient to even pay the actual cost of paper, ink, presswork, mailing, bookkeeping and other expenses of the Circulation department, and thus subscribers have no privileges of free advertising and are on the same footing as non subscribers. Seidom ever does the sender state whether the item is to appear in the Morning Daily or the Rural Daily, whether for one or more times in either Daily, or in both, whether as a display advertisement, announcement, business local, classified ad or otherwise. When for church or charitable purposes they seldom ever say so, or do not enclose sufficient money to pay for same all of which will be returned by first mail in the event of the item not being chargeable, or if more money is sent, than necessary to pay for the item the surplus will be returned at once there being a greater discount for cash with order for advertising of churches & than for regular business. In all such cases the Advertising department communicates with the sender as quickly as possible by mail or phone, often paying the messenger service to get them to the telephone if not too far distant, thus saving all possible time. People write this office to know if News, Letters to Editor, etc., are charged for, and to all such there is but one reply—all items etc., are chargeable, for instance, the advance notice of notices of a concert, lecture, nie social, picnic, etc., are chargeable if an admission fee, silver collection, sale of pies or sale of food or refreshments, etc. Advance notices of purely religious services, even tho a silver collection is to be taken up, are not chargeable. The particulars of any of the above, after they have been held, are, however, news and thus not chargeable. The news of any past, present or future business, which is still being conducted, is chargeable, if it is apparent that the object is to make the business more widely known and thus increase it. Veres accompanying death notices are also chargeable. Even items which are actual news and not chargeable but ones in either morning Daily or Rural Daily or both are chargeable for more than one insertion, as they are thus not news. The above facts are given for the purpose of assisting persons who have items, etc., to mail to this office, so that delay and disappointment will be avoided.

### CLAN REUNION.

GLASGOW, Aug. 24—Historic Duart Castle, known to all visitors to the Isle of Mull, was the scene today of the first national gathering held by any Scottish family since 1745. It was a reunion of the Clan Maclean, of which Colonel Sir Fitzroy Donald Maclean, Bart is the hereditary head. The Maclean family is represented in all parts of the world and is said to number not less than 25,000 members in the United States and Canada. Sir Allan Maclean, who held Quebec against the American forces of Montgomery and Arnold, was a member of the clan, as was also Colonel Allan Maclean of Delaware, who fought valiantly on the side of the Americans in the Revolution.

### Commercial Paper.

It seems inevitable but, that higher rates for money will soon obtain in the New York market. The effect, such an advance will have on commercial and industrial activity is problematic. However, when rates for commercial paper are 6 per cent, it certainly signifies a widespread demand for banking accommodations. At the present time commercial activity is world wide. For this reason New York bankers will not be able to attract money from other centres without over-laying the rates at those centres. The financial situation in New York, while in no way precarious, does demand careful consideration. New York is not in a strong financial position. Germany has paid back our loans made some time ago and, in the meantime, Paris holds New York paper to the extent of some \$50,000,000.

### THE STOCK MARKET.

With few exceptions, prices are lower than they were ten days ago. The strength in individual issues gives the market a deceptive appearance. That prices should lag in the face of the budget of encouraging Stock Market News is disconcerting and would seem to indicate that the upward movement was caused largely by the covering of short contracts. There has been no noticeable investment buying. However, on the other hand, there has been little selling of investment securities. The market again seems to have reached a level

### FOUND DEAD.

TORONTO, Aug. 25—Herbert C. Smythe, aged forty-two, of Lindsay, Ont., was found dead today following a reunion at the home of his brother Sydney D. Smythe, 205 Albany Ave. Brothers from Frontenac and Halifax, N. S., were also in attendance at the gathering which ended in the death of one of the party.

### MONTREAL FATALITIES.

MONTREAL, Aug. 24—One man was killed and another fatally injured early this morning while at work in the excavation for the Canadian Northern Railway tunnel. Two men were at work in the excavation fifty feet below the ground along with six others when one of the big tubs that holds two tons, used for hoisting the earth to the surface, fell into the excavation. Five of the six of the workmen had time to get out of the way when the big tub came tumbling down but one was crushed to death under it, while another sustained internal injuries that may prove fatal.

### EXHIBITION OPENED.

TORONTO, Ont., Aug. 24—The Canadian National Exhibition was formally opened this afternoon by the Duke of Connaught, who pressing an electric button, started the machinery in the various buildings. The opening exercises were witnessed by an immense crowd. The music for the occasion, was furnished by the Scots Guard Band.  
The new Government building, costing \$165,000 and several other large structures have been added to the exposition and the exhibition will continue until September 9. One of the attractive features will be the great camp and review of boy cadets who are gathering here from England, Australia, Canada and other parts of the empire.
