ALL NEWS OF LOCAL INTEREST

THE winter steamers crossed in good time yesterday and the mails reached the city at two o'clock.

DR. GORDON T. ALLEY, J. Morris and Roy McLean, went to Hog Island on a shooting excursion yesterday.

BROKE Stipendiary Blanchard at Souris yesterday Michael Foley for first violation of the Canada Temperance Act was fined \$50 and for second offence \$100.

THE Liberal Conservative Convention at Eton yesterday afternoon to select candidates to contest the Fourth District of Queen's, known as the Belfast district. In the coming local election was largely attended. Henry Wood, Pownal, was chosen as Councillor and Samuel A. Nicholson, son of James Nicholson, Eton as Assembly man.

THE death took place last evening after a lingering illness at the residence of her sister, Mrs. Elizabeth Cooper, Euston Street of Miss Emmeline J. Gidley, youngest daughter of the late R. M. Gidley of this city. The deceased returned from the States some time ago but her health did not improve and medical aid was powerless. To the bereaved relatives The Guardian extends its sincere sympathy.

THE ladies played hockey at the rink before a large and select assemblage last night. Two teams from the Mimosa Club lined up first and the Red Caps defeated the White 3 to 1. Then the "skirted boys" with half-length blade hockey sticks and a piked Mimosa team played the latter winning 5 to 2. Bery Pope Jr. refereed and the Fourth Regiment Band was in attendance. After the games the teams dined at the home of one of the members.

ON Monday in the cemetery at Kensington, the remains of John Glover, Kelvin Grove, were laid to rest. Ripe in years and in blessed hope of a glorious immortality he was gathered to the grave as a sheaf of corn fully ripened. He was sick only a few days and on Saturday March 19th, ninety years old "he fell asleep." He leaves to mourn a kind husband and loving father a sorrowing widow and eight children. Rev. Mr. Murray conducted the services at the house and grave and a large concourse of people followed all that was mortal of a good man to his last resting place. Side by side were laid the old and the young—little George Schurman having been buried a few hours earlier in the day, a striking illustration that all must die. The heartfelt sympathy of the community goes out to the aged widow and family.

FRANCIS STANLEY, an old resident of Charlottetown, who has been spending the winter in Moncton with his son, James L. Stanley, has a very vivid recollection of the earthquake of 1855; says the Moncton Times. He lived in Charlottetown at the time and remembers that the shock was severely felt. Windows were broken in the houses and the disturbance caused much excitement among the people. Mr. Stanley also remembers the earthquake shock of 1847. He was then about 23 years of age and was living in Randolph, Mass. This was by far the most severe disturbance of the earth Mr. Stanley ever remembers. The ground opened a foot or a foot and a half for a distance of between one and two miles. Glass was smashed in the houses, dishes were broken and chimneys tumbled down and people of that section were badly scared. They thought the end of the world had come. The shock however, did no material damage, and there was no loss of life.
