CATS ON OFFICIAL STAFF

LONDON, Nov. 2.—(C. P.)—No fewer than 160 cats are officially entered as being "on the strength" of the staff of the Port of London Authority, the body which controls the mighty docks on the Thames around the metropolis.

These feline four-footed members of the staff keep watch and ward in those warehouses where commodities, excepting foodstuffs, are stored. An official ration per week is allowed for each cat, but many of them provide additions, as it were "out of their own pockets."

The authorized cat staff is admittedly reinforced at times by "native levies." The "regulars" have been known vigorously to repel feline freebooters who have sought to establish a footing in warehouses which the official cats considered to be their exclusive preserves.
