—FIRE.—The church property at Lennox Island had a narrow escape from being wiped out by fire on Monday morning last. While Mr. Michael Thomas was passing the church about 7 o'clock, he discovered smoke issuing from the church. After giving the alarm he effected an entrance and found the flames issuing from a bureau containing the vestments and linen belonging to the church. Fortunately the rector, Rev. J. A. McDonald, had remained over night to attend early Mass and with a number of Indians was soon on the scene and without loss of time, some of the Indians picked up the burning bureau and carried it to the shore. In the meantime the fire had spread to the altar rail, but was extinguished with some difficulty. The origin of the fire is unknown. The vestments had been used at vespers the previous evening after which they had been placed in one of the drawers into which a spark had evidently lodged.

—STOCKHOLM, July 22 (Special).—A terrifying accident to a Swedish submarine, which sank with her crew like a stone in 200 feet of water on July 2, has just become known, despite official efforts to keep the affair secret.

—The submarine was practising outside the harbor when by a mistake all her tanks were filled simultaneously and she sank to the bottom.

—The pressure was enormous and the water began to dent the hull.

—Desperate measures were necessary and Lieutenant Beckman, in charge of the boat, ordered the lead keel detached. When this was removed the boat rose to the surface and the shaken crew drew in great draughts of air.

—PARIS, July 12.—The heavy French budget deficit, which will certainly lead to the floating of a big loan in the near future, is held to be significant of the present state of the money market and is arousing grave disquiet among financial experts.

—The world, it is declared, has been hounded and borrowing as if it had unlimited resources, and now France, for one, must soon have recourse to the \$200,000,000 loan now being considered by Parliament, as well as a special war loan of \$400,000,000 which will burden succeeding budgets with a perpetual interest item of \$14,000,000, in addition to over \$200,000,000 to the taxes to make both ends meet in the future.

—The debit balance this year between receipts and payments is estimated at no less than \$154,000,000, which may possibly be before the end of the year be reduced to \$100,000,000.

—LONDON, July 19.—(Special)—The theft of a pearl necklace valued at
