THE MARKETS

(Canadian Press)

MONTREAL, Dec. 4.—The export trade in Canadian grain on the Montreal market was of a very limited character owing to the falling in the demand from foreign buyers which was attributed to the high prices asked by exporters. The only business of importance in cash grain on the local market was the renewed demand from buyers for American corn. The demand in oats was quiet but the tone of the market for Ontario grades was steady. There were no further developments in the spring and winter wheat flour markets the volume of business being fair and prices were firm. The recent advance noted. Prices for all grades of millfeed were well maintained under a good demand. The undertone for the market for rolled oats was steady and the trade volume was moderate. The egg market continued quiet but prices were firm. The butter and cheese markets were inactive but firm.

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 4.—Eggs—Montreal egg market is weaker today and Vancouver remains steady at the recent drop. Other Canadian markets are unchanged. A sharp drop in fresh is reported from both Chicago and New York. Toronto is unchanged. Manitoba—Eggs—Egg market is weaker with carlots of April eggs graded as extras into storage offering an extra 12c. The market is steady. Edmonston egg market is steady. Local market is firm with light receipts dealing quoting country shippers 19 for No. 1 live turkeys and 25 for dressed. Vancouver 15 to 58, seconds and pullets 46 to 48. Poultry steady and unchanged. St. John, N. B., fresh eggs arriving in small quantities wholesale price fresh extra 70, first 60, seconds 50, extra firsts 43, seconds 40, retail fresh extras 80, firsts 70, seconds 55, storage firsts 50, seconds 45, fresh killed chickens 35 to 40, fowl 30, poultry stocks light. Halifax, N. S., very few fresh eggs arriving with a few on city market retailing at 90, storage supplies from Prince Edward Island are of fair quality with prices unchanged. There is a good sale for storage stocks on this market. Poultry quiet with supplies well maintained and prices unchanged.

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Chimneys Most Frequent Cause Of Dwelling Fires

A recent Bulletin of the National Fire Protection Association entitled, "Make Your Chimneys Safe", contains the following valuable and astounding information regarding chimneys:

"Defective chimneys and flues are responsible for more home fires than any other cause. In the past decade they have caused a loss estimated at \$180,500,000. Unnumbered lives, mostly women and children, have been lost in fires, due to this most unnecessary cause.

"So easily prevented by common sense in constructing chimneys and keeping them clean, it is amazing that we should continue to build them in a fashion that engenders tragedies and losses.

"Everybody ought to learn, remember and enforce the main factors contributing to safe flue construction, which are designed to make the smoke, flame, heat and gases of combustion go into the air through the top of the chimneys rather than through the building through its sides. Because fires from defective flues start underneath rooms, back of ranges, under hearths and in other places not in plain view, it does not follow that there is anything mysterious about them or that they cannot be readily prevented.

"Chimney fires are due to accumulations of soot, caused by imperfect combustion of fuel and neglect to clean the chimney. A continually and freely smoking chimney is a sure sign of imperfect combustion. Intelligent firing and proper design of the heating equipment will largely eliminate this. Chimneys should be cleaned at least once a year, and oftener, if necessary.

"If the exposed outside surface of a chimney is at any time too hot to rest the hand against without discomfort, it is indication that any wood work in contact with it is in an unsafe condition.

"A smoke test is a simple method of detecting the presence of cracks or other openings in flues. The method is to build a smudge fire in the furnace or boiler connected with the bottom of the flue and when the smoke is flowing freely, close it tightly at the top.

The escape of smoke through the chimney walls or into other flues indicates the fact that it should be corrected.

Vancouver To Have Fine Art Gallery

VANCOUVER, Dec. 4.—Eleven Vancouver citizens have agreed to donate \$100,000 for the purchase of an art gallery, which they suggest should be erected on the proposed civic centre site. One of the subscribers, H. A. Stone, heads the list of contributors with \$50,000. Those who have undertaken to contribute stipulate that a suitable building shall be erected by the city within two years. The estimated cost is \$280,000.

Sir R. Squires Was Fined \$6,400

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec. 4.—Sir Richard Squires, former Premier of Newfoundland, was fined \$6,400 today for failure to make income tax returns during the years from 1918 to 1924. The case, prosecuted by the Minister of Finance, had been in the courts for some time and judgment was handed down this morning. The defendant was fined \$900 for each year he failed to comply with the income tax regulations during the period from 1918 to 1924. He was also fined \$1,000 for each year he failed to file a return.
